THE SIDELINERS

The Sideliners are a group of individuals who act as "big brothers" for the varsity gridders. The Sideliners were organized in 1957 during the final season of Coach Lee Tressel. Each active Sideliner is assigned a Tiger player to help him in any possible way. The active Sideliners meet with "their players" before and after each pre-season, regular season, and post-season game. Weekly, the players and Sideliners attend a 6:00 p.m. meal on the night prior to each game.

Assignments to a Sideliner are discussed between the Head Coach, an Assistant Coach, present and past Chairmen of the Sideliners, and the Secretary of the group. This is done in late May to early June. One of the first functions as a group is the North-South All-Star Game held at Paul Brown Tiger Stadium in late June. This is generally the first time a Sideliner and his player meet each other.

Once the season begins, eight group dinners are scheduled for the evening before the game at a different location each week. These dinners are considered mandatory for the players, which must be enforced by the coaches. The Sideliners request representation from the coaching staff at these dinners. Two dinner nights are left open for the Sideliner and his player to go "on their own" to any restaurant they wish. Some Sideliners have a family dinner at home with their player as a guest.

After playoffs in December, the Sideliner's final function of the year is the Annual Sportsmanship Banquet. The top player from each team we played during the season is honored at this dinner. (It is a good idea to pick this player weekly while the game is still fresh in your mind!) Some of the honorees in the past have included Charles Woodson and Desmond Howard!

SIDELINERS HONOR SULLIVAN

Tiger, Lincoln Teams Awaiting Kickoff

The cast has been changed, but the annual Massillon-Canton football rivalry goes on this afternoon at Tiger stadium just the same.

This year Canton Lincoln will provide the opposition for the Tigers in their season finale. The Lions are substitutes for Canton McKinley, which is finishing out a one-year football suspension.

KICKOFF will be at 2 p. m. with weather conditions not the best. A light rain has been falling all night and morning. It is supposed to turn to snow during the afternoon. However, the tarpaulin has been off the field since Friday morning. The gridiron will be dry at the start.

The traditional dinner of the Tiger Sideliners group was held at the American Legion hall Friday night. All coaches — both in the high school and junior highs — were guests. So were team managers, doctors, statisticians, the equipment manager and the trainer.

Coach Leo Strang introduced his staff. Chuck Gump, Sideliners president, introduced visiting members of the press and radio plus the other non-coaching team personnel who were guests.

The first annual "Tiger Sideliners Citizen's Athletic Award" was presented to senior defensive

halfback Ron (Silky) Sullivan. A panel of four Sideliners, whose identity was kept a secret, did the choosing. The selection was made on the basis of the following criteria: the winner must (1) be a gentleman always, (2) be considerate of his fellow teammates, (3) be encouraging towards his teammates and (4) be a real "Tiger" and command the respect of everyone.

The award was made by Lon Peacock, head of the selection committee, now living in Medina. He made a special trip back to Massillon to be on hand for the presentation and the game today.

THE TEAM had breakfast at Washington high school this morning and then participated in the traditional service at St. Timothy's Episcopal church. The Rev. James Millar, rector, was in charge.

There are 15 seniors on the team. However, one — and possibly two — will not see action. Co-Captain Jim Ehmer has been lost since the Steubenville game due to a shoulder separation. Co-Captain Ben Bradley received a slightly chipped ankle in practice Wednesday. His status is doubtful. Both boys will be in uniform, however. They'll be on the bench to cheer on their team to victory.

Quarterback Ron Swartz, a

junior, will probably also not see action. He re-injured a knee in practice Wednesday and was limping badly Friday.

The other seniors in the orange and black grid togs for the last time today will be Sullivan, quarterback Mike Koenig, halfback Ron Davis, halfback John Kanney, kicking specialist Wil Patsley, short side guard Chester Randles, long side guard Bob Geckler, long side guard Randy McDew, linebacker Paul Fabianich, outside tackle Roland Mercer, outside tackle Dale Clendening, inside tackle Bob Profant and defensive end Walt Franklin.

The seniors bade farewell to their teammates with the customary senior tackle of the sophomores at the last practice Friday. There was the senior's last climb of the hill to the "Blarney Stone" and a cry of "Beat Lincoln" ringing out over the field. There was also the traditional ceremony of the seniors running off the practice field for the last time through two lines of their teammates.

1. Pick up your player each Thursday by 5:30 p.m. and see that he gets home after the meal. If you cannot be there, call your player and make arrangements for him to go with another sideliner.
2. Be positive with him, the team, and the coaching staff.
3. Encourage him to work harder on the field and in the classroom.
4. Invite him to attend some social events or to your house during the season and also out-of-season.
5. Try to guide him in the right directions, especially with his off-the-field activities.
6. Talk to his coach about any special problems he has at home or in school.
7. Try to attend J.V. Games if he is playing.
8. Come into the locker room to see him after the game.
9. Talk to his parents about any problems in which you can help.
10. Check on him Thursday night before a big game.
11. Encourage player to abide by all the team training rules set forth by the coaches.
12. Support all Sideliner Fund Raising Projects.
13. Be a good listener. Try to give him some good advice.

SIDELINERS DON'TS

1. Be critical of your player, the team, or the coaching staff.
2. Encourage him to break our training rules or regulations.
3. Tell him how to play his position or how great you were as a player.
4. Drop him off at a girl friends house on Thursday night.
5. Complain about the food or take him to some other place to eat.
6. Give him expensive gifts or money especially for Tackles or Touchdowns.
7. Ignore him when he needs help or a job.
8. Give up on him when he is in trouble or is not playing.
9. Ask him for information about the team other players, or force him to talk football when he is not allowed to respond.
10. Try to be his father unless he needs one.
11. Be a buddy or pal when he needs guidance instead.
12. Agree with your player when you know he is wrong.

INFORMATION REGARDING
MASSILLON TIGER BOOSTER CLUB
AND SIDELINERS ORGANIZATION

1963

The Massillon Tiger Booster Club has been in operation since 1933. The Executive Committee of the Booster Club constitutes all past presidents of the organization and the current president, vice president, secretary, and treasurer. This is the policymaking group of the organization, however, there are no written by-laws or constitution by which the group operates. The President and Vice President are elected each year, however, it has been historic that the individual elected Vice President succeeds to the Presidency the following year. The Secretary and Treasurer are appointed, and we have maintained the same two individuals in this capacity for a great number of years. We also have a Junior Executive Committee which is composed of a number of young men who we think eventually could become president of the organization.

The basic purpose is to back and promote high school football in Massillon. We have no by-laws or constitution, but we work primarily with the head football coach and athletic director in doing what he feels should be done to create enthusiasm in our townspeople in the interest of good football and fair play on and off the athletic field. It should be clearly noted that it is not the function of our organization, nor has it ever been the practice of our meddling in the football program or any other athletic program in which the high school participates. Quite to the contrary, for we have worked for many years in close cooperation with the athletic department and the Massillon Washington High School administration. In many instances we have supported and have actually participated in functions that the school administration might feel we could be of some help.

We have two means of raising funds for our Booster Club activities. One is advertising in our football program, and the other is selling Booster Club memberships. One dollar (\$1.00) buys a membership in the Club. We have between 1900 to 2300 members annually. We kick off our membership campaign in the Spring with a Stag which is open to all who wish to attend. Admission is \$2.50 - \$1.00 is for the Booster Club membership and the other sum is to help defray the cost of the Stag. During the Stag we have a speaker and we usually try to get one of the ex-Massillon coaches to come in for this purpose, and refreshments are served.

It should be noted that at this time we start a personal campaign for members. The governing body of the Booster Club is divided into teams to sell memberships. This campaign lasts one month, then just before the football season starts we go over the last years membership and send a letter to all those who haven't joined in the Spring. Approximately 1/3 of the letters come back with the membership dues enclosed.

Our Executive Committee meets monthly during the off-season to lay plans for the upcoming season. We have found that this keeps the basic group in tact and keeps their interest involved in our program. Also a great many projects can be initiated, such as scheduling a train for the away games, etc.

During the football season, an open meeting is held each Monday night where we show movies of last week's game and the head coach explains what happened during that contest and what to expect of the opponent in the upcoming game. It is our practice of giving door prizes at the Monday night meetings, such as two free tickets to the next game and a stadium blanket with a large M in school colors.

We try to do something a little special for each of the games the coaching staff thinks is going to be tough. These assignments are handled by members of the Executive Committee and are subject to the approval of the President and the Athletic Director. This might range from passing out "beat" signs to a full-scale effort for our arch rival, which includes a parade with floats and the high school band, pep rally at the school, and a large bonfire the night before the game. One of the most important features are signs and slogans that we put in the locker room each week. The head coach decides if, what, and when signs are to be placed in the locker room.

In 1958, we established the practice of giving a small football with black printing, "compliments of the Tiger Booster Club," to all new born baby boys in the city of Massillon. This program has been very successful in building our public relations in the community. Each year we also have bumper signs printed and distributed to all who want them. With each Booster Club membership we give a small pin. This is "Obie" Tiger, which is a mascot of our Booster Club. This was started in 1952 and each Booster Club president must paint enough for distribution in his year. Each year the pin is different to distinguish it from previous years. A sample of the Obie pin is enclosed.

Another organization, which is an important branch of the Booster Club, is called the Tiger Sideliners. This is composed of a group of men numbering around 180 who are very closely associated with the boys on the team. Of the 180 members, approximately 70 of these are active, which is sufficient in number for assignment purposes. Each Thursday night during the regular football season, the Sideliners and their boys go out to dinner after the practice session and then to a movie together. It is the responsibility of the adult Sideliner to pick his boy up at the stadium after practice on Thursday night and see that he gets to the dinner and the movie, and in turn, must have the boy home by 9:00 P. M. that evening.

In this organization, the cost of membership is \$15. As you can see, the cost is considerably more than a Booster Club member, but the \$15 is used to pay the cost of providing the boys' meals each Thursday night. The Sideliner is assigned a player in January and is active with this boy until the completion of football season.

Both organizations have one main purpose, that being to support and encourage outstanding football and creating a proper spirit and sense of fair play throughout the students and townspeople in our community.

Massillon does not breed any particular type of boy to play football. However, one thing is quite evident, tradition, school and town support have carried many of our teams, which compared to our opposition looked insurmountable, to undefeated season and state championships.

We would like to believe that the Massillon Booster Club has been an important part of the tradition, spirit, and support that has made the football program in Massillon successful. In thirty-one years, Massillon has gained 21 State Championships in football. Enclosed is a copy of our fact finder booklet for more details.

Coach Leo Strang remarked that he had never worked with more enthusiastic student body during his six seasons here and had never seen more spirit from the town as a whole.

The team was escorted out of town via another parade the morning after attending special services at St. Timothy's Episcopal church.

There were 21 busloads of fans here from the lake shore.

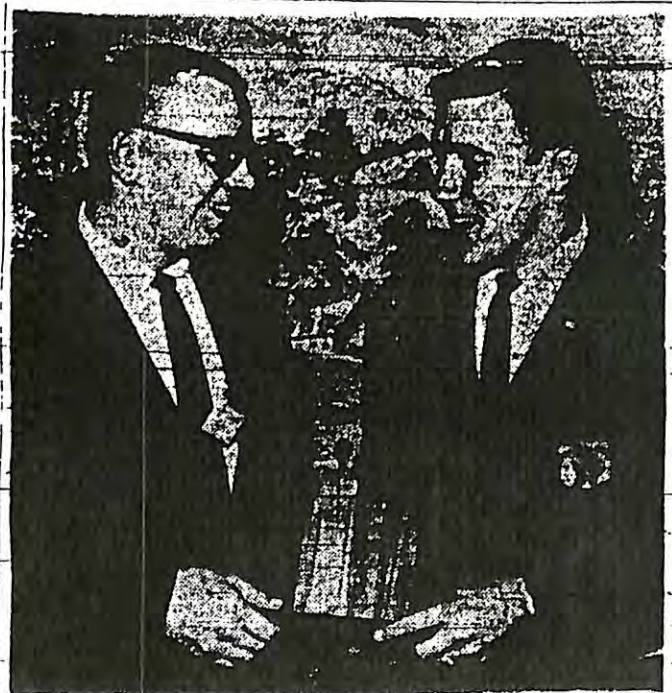
EASTLAKE'S band, in colorful orange and black uniforms, put on a halftime show that was a review of its entertainment

Massillon gave Bruce Midas Touch

MASSILLON — For Ohio State University head football coach Earle Bruce, Thursday night's 31st annual Sportsmanship Awards Banquet at the Knights of Columbus Hall took him back in time.

"I was thinking on the way up here what it means to honor your opponents' best football player," he said. "It takes me back to 1964-65."

It was during those two seasons that Bruce guided the Massillon Tigers to successive 10-0 seasons. Since then he's had the Midas Touch wherever he's gone.

A year after leaving Massillon Bruce became an assistant coach at OSU under the legendary Woody Hayes. He spent six years in that role before taking his first collegiate head coaching job at the University of Tampa.

At Tampa he fashioned a 10-2 record that earned the school a berth in the Tangerine Bowl.

The following year he became head coach at Iowa State University, taking a program that had five straight losing seasons and turning it into a constant winner. His last three years he took the Cyclones to 8-3 records and two bowl appearances. He was also named Big 8 coach of the year twice.

In 1979 Bruce returned to his alma mater at Ohio State. The Buckeyes have ventured to bowl country five times since, this year being named to oppose the University of Pittsburgh in the Fiesta Bowl Jan. 2. Bruce's record at OSU is a sterling 46-13-0 record, including 8-3 this year.

Despite his success at OSU, Bruce said he wasn't pleased with the Buckeye record

this year, which included close losses to Iowa, Illinois and Michigan.

"I'm very disappointed as are our coaches and players. When you're not 11-0 and going to the Rose Bowl that's a problem at Ohio State," he said. "If you dwell on those things though, you're a loser. The bright spot is that we had a good game against Oklahoma, and we're looking forward to playing Pitt."

Bruce said Ohio has many outstanding high school senior football players who will be heavily recruited.

"It seems to me that there are great prospects in the state of Ohio this year, more so than any other year since I've been here," he said. "You always look to the great football player in the state first."

Bruce went on to say the Buckeyes lost its entire linebacking group, including the defensive backfield and receivers. OSU will be looking to fill those voids in coming months.

"We'd like to have Chris Spielman (Tiger linebacker and running back) come to Ohio State," Bruce admitted. He also added that anybody with any pull should blister Spielman's ears about the virtues of OSU football and academics.

"The most important thing in the world is your education. Once football is over you still have your education, you have a job and a career," Bruce said. "Football tells you whether you win or lose, but life is a much bigger scoreboard."

Bruce praised the coaches of Massillon football, past and present for undertaking such a pressure-filled task. He thanked the parents of athletes who take the time and care for their young men.

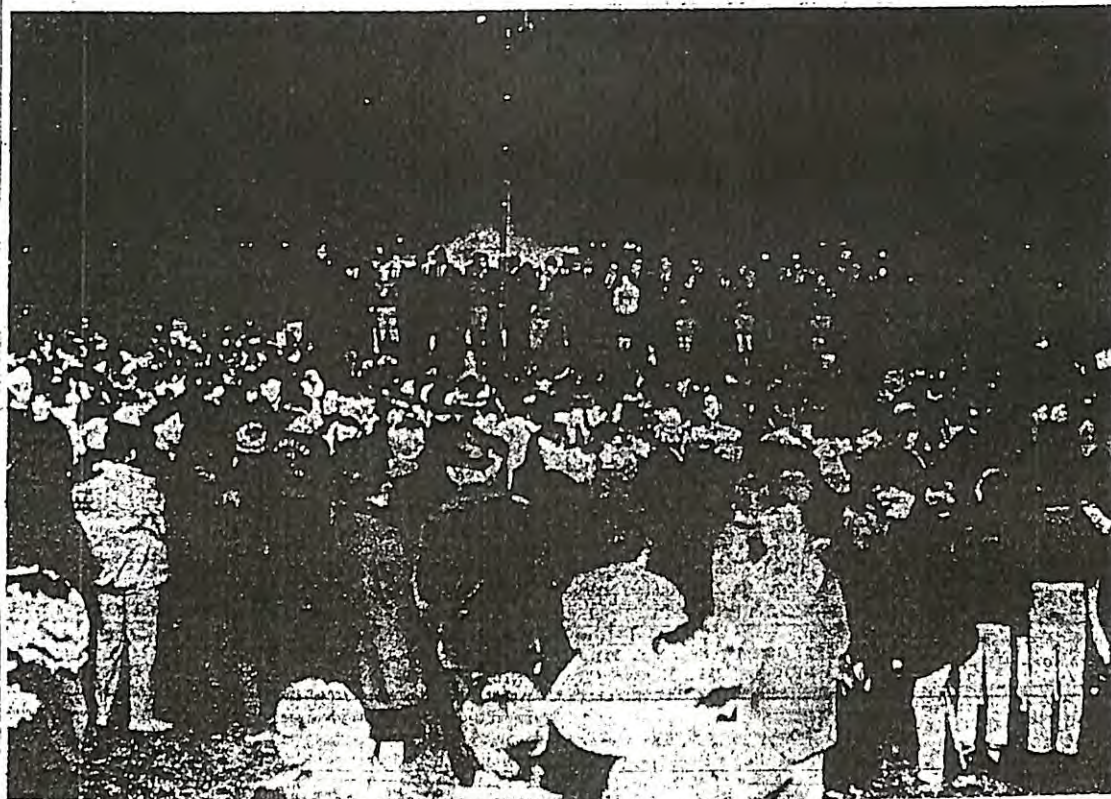

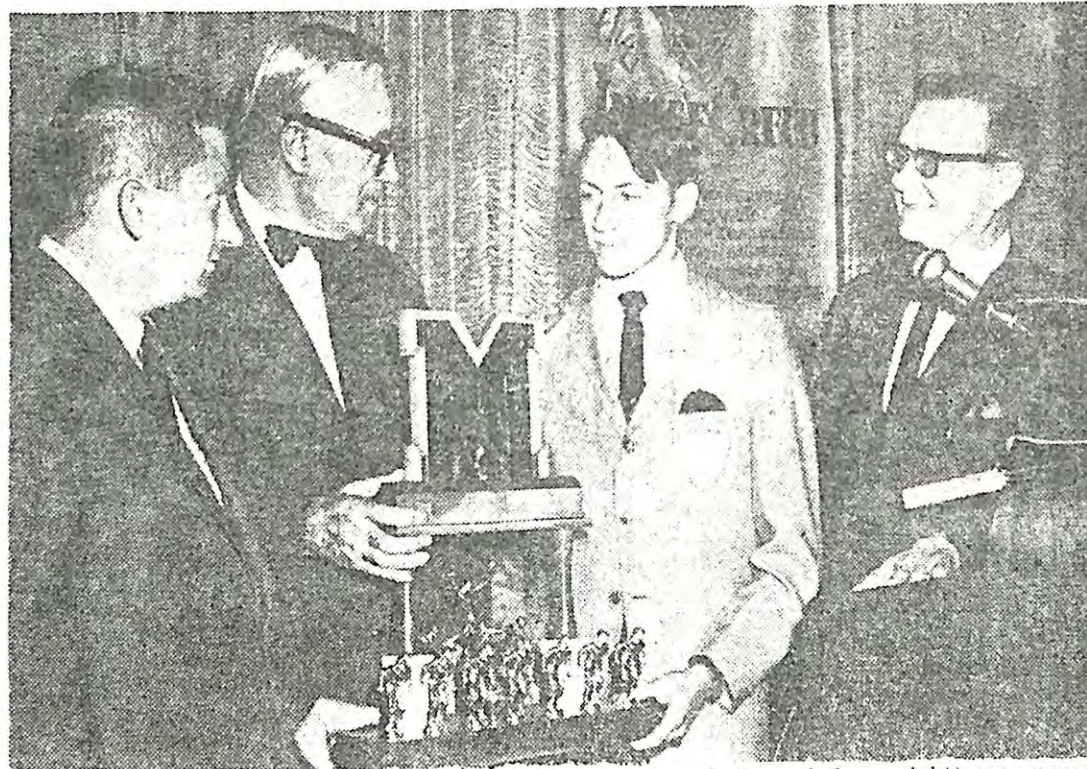

First president and still a member of the executive committee — as are all past presidents — is A. A. (Tink) Ulrich, a retired vice president of Ohio Water Service Co. During the regime of Chuck Mather, in 1952, a junior executive committee was formed.

The club meets each Monday night during the season to hear the coach and view movies of preceding games. Membership fee is \$2, a rise in price of \$1 to meet the increase in ex-

The next oldest club is the Touchdown unit, started during Mather's tenure. Businessmen unable to get to the Booster club sessions on Monday night get their chance to hear the coach on Monday noon.

On the Monday following the end of the season, the club holds a luncheon for players and coaches at which time the Hardnose award is presented to a player. The trophy was originated in 1963 under Earle Bruce's regime.

Andrew Hrivnak is the president this year.

Membership fee is \$3.

DR. LEE TRESSEL, present athletic director and head pigskin coach at Baldwin-Wallace college, started the Tiger Sideliners in 1957. Members of this club act as "Big Brothers" to football players with each member being assigned a player for the season.

This year the format has been changed by Coach Bob Commings. In previous years, the group and players met each Thursday night for dinner.

The number of dinners has been cut and the day switched to Tuesday. Members will go by bus on a couple of special trips to college games with the team.

Saturday morning swims and noon luncheons after grading sessions have become a part of the program. Sunday dinner at his Sideliner's home will be a feature for every gridder.

ONCE AGAIN the Tiger citizen Athlete award will be presented after the season — at the annual football banquet.

Cost of memberships is \$20 in order to defray transportation and dinner expenses.

Three booster clubs back WHS football

Washington high football is backed by three booster organizations, with the oldest being the Tiger Booster club.

Founded by the late Karl Young in 1934, the Tiger Booster club is generally regarded at the graddaddy of them all.

COUNTLESS TIMES through the past 36 years, requests have come to Tigertown for information on how to form a booster club. The Tiger club has been the most successful down through the years.

Young's idea was to establish

a forum in which Coach Paul Brown could explain his coaching ideas and listen to questions from the fans. The club was an instant success.

Young became the fourth president in 1938. Arvine A. (Tink) Ulrich was the first chief. Present boss is Wilbur Arnold.

The club of some 2,000 members, many of which are women, meets once a week during the season and co-sponsors, with the Washington high athletic board, a post-season banquet.

Next group to be organized was the Touchdown club, a luncheon group which meets each week during the season. It is a form of convenience for those who can not get to the booster club sessions.

The group came into being in the late 40s when Chuck Mather was in the process of fashioning six consecutive state

AT THE end of the season, the club hosts the team and coaches in a luncheon and presents the "Hard-Nose award".

Current president is State Rep. Richard Reichel, a past booster president.

Dr. Leo Tressel, then WHS coach, organized the Tiger Sideliners in the mid '50s. Each Sideliner "adopts" a player as a buddy for the season.

In 1969, coach Bob Cummings changed the format of the club. Several dinners with the players are held each season. There are trips to college and pro games and a Sunday in the Sideliners' home, among other activities.

If a player should have a complaint or suggestion, the Sideliner listens. He greets his player before and after each game via a human tunnel leading from the dressing room.

Following the season, the club presents the "Tiger Sideliner Citizen Athlete award".

Reed Wallace is the current president.

Arnold asks that any Tiger fans who have wood they wish to donate for the fire can begin piling it at the south stadium parking lot Tuesday.

When it comes to booster power, the Massillon Tigers have more backing than any high school team in the country.

Three clubs are connected with the high school. Another is an independent group, but just as important as the others.

The "Granddaddy" of them all is the Tiger Booster Club which first started giving its support in the days of Paul Brown. The late Karl Young was the founder in 1934.

AS FANS STARTED to criticize Brown — as they do all coaches — Young realized the then young mentor needed a forum in which to explain his coaching ideas and to answer questions. The club was an instant success.

So successful has it become, countless times through the last 37 years, requests have come to Tigertown for information on how to form a booster club.

Young became the fourth president. A. A. (Tink) Ulrich was the initial chief. Don McFarren is this year's boss.

The club meets each Monday night in the Washington high auditorium during the football season and not only hears Coach Bob Commings, but also watches films of the preceding week's game.

The club has some 2,000 members — many of whom are women — and co-sponsors, with the Washington high athletic board, a post-season banquet.

The Touchdown club came into existence during the Chuck Mather era, starting in 1948. Many of its members are loyal boosters who have conflicts with the Tiger Booster club's nighttime schedule. The T club meets Monday noons at the

The group has used one other location for its meetings — the former Oriole Home.

Dennis Rambaud, an outstanding Tiger lineman of the mid '60s, is the current president.

Reese asked not to be named president, promising to take the post later and did in 1967. Norm Smith wielded the first gavel.

In 1959, the Raiders started their post-season "E" Award banquet at which they honor an outstanding Tiger. The "E" stands for endeavor, effort and efficiency.

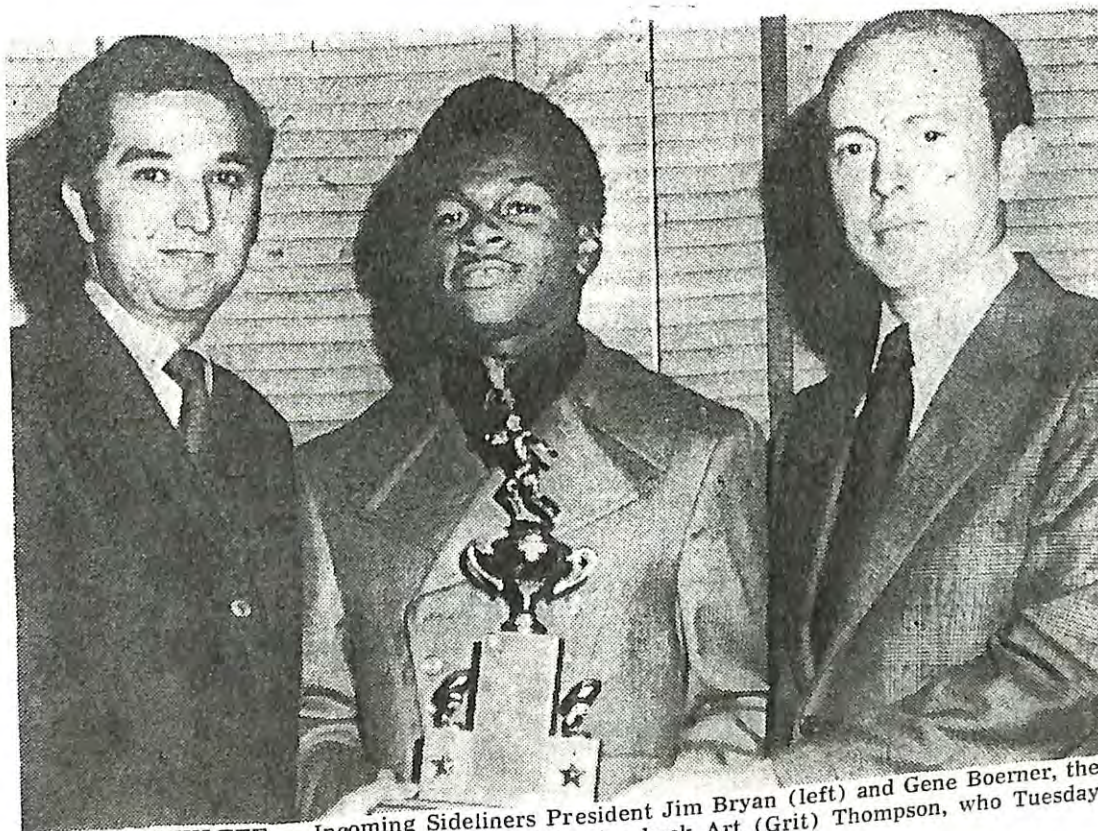
