Converse new president

Tiger BC announces plans for grid museum

Plans for the future establishment of a Massillon Tiger Football Museum were announced at Wednesday evening's meeting of the Tiger Booster Club when the presidential post changed hands.

Pete Spuhler, the outgoing president, turned over the gavel to "Pokey" Converse.

the new president who will be the basis of a novel project to raise seed money for the museum.

Converse, who is overweight, has started a diet and will be the subject of a Reduce-A-Thon as a means of gaining some funds to explore museum plans. He is asking Booster Club members and fans to

sign pledge cards to contribute anything from a penny on up to the club for every pound he loses in his diet between now and the next Canton McKinley game.

To get an official starting point for the diet, a weigh-in was held prior to the meeting. An ordinary scales

would not handle Converse's weight, so he went to the scales of the Massillon Steel Casting Co., where Spuhler is employed and the latter served as the official weigher-in. "Pokey" tipped the beam at 430 pounds. If he fails to take off 50, all pledge cards will be torn up, but if he gets rid of more than that those who sign pledge cards of a penny or more will be expected to pay their pledge for every lost pound.

Jim Bryan, a past president of the Tiger Booster Club, explained plans for the museum and made it plain that the project is just in the exploratory stage and that a committee for the project is being appointed. He asked Boosters who know of any memorabilia suitable for such a museum, to notify him, Converse, Spuhler or any member of the Tiger Booster Club committee.

Mike Currence, Tiger athletic director and head football coach was given a standing ovation when introduced. He showed motion pictures of last Saturday's game with Canton McKinley, which the Tigers won 13-10, and criticized the present computer system that selects teams for the state championship playoffs. He added that he would be willing to put the Tigers against any of the playoff teams.

THE MASSILLON TIGER FOOTBALL

MUSEUM is the fulfillment of an idea conceived by the football booster club in 1979. In that year plans were made, a committee formed and seed money raised to start a booster club sponsored museum that would dedicate its activities to preserving the history of the Tiger football program and its many gridiron accomplishments. That initial endeavor has culminated in a very gratifying collection of memorabilia for future generations of football fans to review and enjoy. The collection process has been ongoing for over twenty five years and donations of Massillon football related items are always welcome. Documentation, repair, preservation and storage of valued items is also an ongoing process and is done by the committee members on a voluntary basis. A detailed account of all items collected is still not available but the following information about specific categories of memorabilia will explain what is being done.

Film---Approximately 1600 reels of silent 16mm films have been found and archived. After repair and cleaning they are transferred to video. Film content includes football, band and basketball. To date 480,000 feet of film has filled up 170 video tapes. The oldest film is 50 feet in length from 1924 which shows Elwood Kammer's 65yd TD return of a pass interception to beat McKinley 6-0. Many of the films have been used to make special production videos and are available for purchase. (see the separate catalogue for the listing of these special productions)

Video---Taping of Tiger home & away football games plus football related events began in 1979. The sound track on most of the game tapes is play-by-play radio broadcast audio provided by station WTIG. All of these tapes are available for purchase. (a listing of these game video tapes can be found on the booster club web site---Massillontigers.com)

Audio---Reel-to-reel tapes with radio broadcast recordings of Tiger games were donated to the museum and are being used to produce special production videos by synchronizing the associated game films to the radio audio when possible. The recordings are mainly Massillon-McKinley games with the earliest one being 1953. However, the oldest radio game audio is 1944 via two 16 inch diameter 78RPM transcription discs of the Massillon - McKinley game and Tiger Swing Band halftime show. Film of the 1944 game and band for this audio is in the museum archives and will be synchronized in the future. Also, many reel-to-reel tapes of Massillon high school concert band performances are in the museum archives.

Photographs--- The collection numbers in the hundreds and are being repaired (if needed) and catalogued. Typical photos are of teams, coaching staffs, game action, players and the Tiger Swing band. One of the oldest found is a 1925 group shot of Paul Brown, Elwood Kammer, Arden McConnell, Whitey Laughlin in uniform that was enlarged and hung in the top floor of the East side stadium press box.

Printed Media---This category includes books, magazines, newspapers, game programs, media guides and school yearbooks. These publications abound with stories and information of the history of the Massillon high school Tigers. An abridged listing of these items is as follows:

Books: The Paul Brown Story by Jack Clary; The Massillon Tigers Story by John (Jack) White Jr.; The Town Tiger by Wibur Arnold Jr.; Massillon Memories by Scott Shook; Ohio High School Football by Carl Benhase; James by Coach Don James as told to Virgil Parker; EARLE A Coach's Life by Earle Bruce with George & Darcy Lehner.

Magazines: LIFE (1939); Pathfinder (1947); HOLIDAY (1949); SPORT (1951); Ohio's FIRST and TEN (1953); People (1953); LOOK (1955); LIFE (1955); Sports Illustrated (1961); HIGH SCHOOL FOOTBALL (1963); ESQUIRE (1965); Boys' Life (1966); CLEVELAND (1977); OHIO (1983); Sports Illustrated (1994).

Newspapers: Over 5,000 original pages have been found and preserved from 13 Ohio cities and cities from 9 other states plus national editions such as The National Observer (1963); USA Today (1985,1993,2001); The Wall Street Journal (1984). The oldest publication archived is a 1903 Massillon Independent. The most unique find was the entire year's edition of the 1932 Massillon Independent: the year Paul Brown became head coach.

Printed Media---(continued)

Game Programs: Approximately 3,500 have been collected dating back to Massillon's first issue in 1934. The oldest official program found is for the 1933 Massillon – McKinley game. Before programs the fans were given cards with team schedules, or rosters or starting line-ups. The oldest such card is 1923.

Media Guides: Original copies of these yearly information publications reside in the museum.

School Yearbooks: The following 17 Massillon Washington High School yearbooks reside in the museum. 1912, 15, 16, 25, 26, 46, 52, 54, 55, 56, 57, 58, 61, 64, 66, 70, 2002. There is also one 1929 Canton McKinley yearbook.

Collectables—This group of memorabilia includes team banquet glasses, clothing, pennants, scrapbooks, flags, footballs and etc.... They are too numerous to mention and still being catalogued.

The roots of the game of football are anchored deep in North East Ohio and especially Stark County where the first Massillon Washington High School team was organized in 1894. The sport quickly became a favorite pastime as attendance grew yearly with a record setting 20,000 plus fans jamming the stadium in 1936 to watch the 9 and 0 Tigers of Massillon take on the 9 and 0 Bulldogs of Canton. The head coach of the Tigers that year was Paul Brown who established a successful football program and winning tradition during his nine years at Massillon. The winning tradition continued with other head coaches and it is this continued history of gridiron success that the Football Museum is trying to preserve. Few towns in America have been recognized as much as Massillon has for its success on the high school gridiron and the museum wants to ensure that this tradition becomes established fact and not a legend that cannot be verified.

The football teams, along with the marching bands, have over many years produced what is affectionately now called "The High School Football Capital of the World." One out-of-state newspaper writer put it this way ---

The Philadelphia Inquirer – Nov, 10, 1940

"Out of the cradle of professional football, a new gridiron show has been born, where world championship professional teams were turned out many times in the first 18 years of the century, is now producing what sportswriters describe as the "Greatest high school show in the country."



REGULATIONS

OF THE
MASSILLON TIGER HIGH SCHOOL
FOOTBALL MUSEUM, INC.

ARTICLE I

The purposes of the Corporation are to gather, collect, store and exhibit to the public, memorabilia of the football and general history of the Washington High School in Massillon, Ohio, and to receive funds to be used for historical, literary and educational purposes relating to the establishment and maintenance of a museum.

ARTICLE II

The membership of the Corporation shall be the members of the Senior Executive (Committee) of the Massillon Tiger Football Bopster Club. Honorary members may be elected by the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLE III

SECTION 1. The annual meeting of the members shall be held at 153 Lincoln Way East, Massillon, Ohio, or at such other place as designated by the Board of Trustees on the third Thursday of August of each year at 7:30 P.M. The first annual meeting of members shall be held in 1980.

SECTION 2. Special meetings of the members may be held at such times and places as may be ordered by the Board of Trustees, or upon call of the President. Notice of such meetings shall be given to each member by written notice, by telephone notice or by personal notice.

SECTION 3. At all meetings, the members present in person or by proxy, shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

DOCUMENTS

ARTICLE IV

SECTION 1. The corporate powers, property and affairs of the Corporation, subject to the limitations contained in the Ohio Revised Code, the Articles of Incorporation and these Regulations, shall be exercised, conducted and controlled by a Board of Trustees consisting of eleven (11) persons, eight (8) of which must be members of the Corporation. The Trustees shall serve for a term of one (1) year or until their successors have been elected and qualified.

SECTION 2. A resignation from the Board of Trustees shall be deemed to take effect upon its receipt by the Secretary, unless some other time is specified therein. In the event of any vacancy, the remaining Trustees, although less than a majority of the whole Board of Trustees, by the affirmative vote of those present at any duly convened meeting may elect a successor to hold office for the unexpired term of the Trustee whose place shall be vacant, and until the election and qualification of a successor.

SECTION 3. Meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be held upon the call of the President or upon request of any three (3) Trustees. The Secretary shall give notice of each meeting to each member of the Board of Trustees by mail, by telephone or by personal contact. When notice of a future meeting has been given members in attendance at a regular or special meeting, no further notice need be given such members.

SECTION 4. The original Trustees shall be James J. Bryan, Paul J. Studer, Gene P. Boerner, Arvine A. Ulrich, Maurice D. Basler, Richard G. Reichel, Wilbur V. Arnold, John L. Muhlbach, ^{JE} Louis C. Young, James C. DeLong, and Luther H. Emery.

ARTICLE V

SECTION 1. The executive officers of the Corporation to be elected by the Board of Trustees shall be a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary, and a Treasurer. All officers shall be members of the Board of Trustees and shall hold office for one (1) year or until their successors are elected and qualified. Additional officers may be elected or appointed from time to time as determined by the Board of Trustees.

SECTION 2. Any officer, employee or agent elected or appointed by the Board of Trustees may be removed at any time upon vote of the majority of the whole Board of Trustees.

ARTICLE VI

SECTION 1. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all meetings and in general, to perform all of the duties incident to such office for which may be designated to the office by the Board of Trustees.

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of the Vice-President to perform all of the duties of the President in case of the President's absence or disability and such other duties as delegated to him by the President.

SECTION 3. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep an accurate list of the members of the Corporation, and record the acts and proceedings of the members of the Corporation and the Board of Trustees and to give notices as required by these Regulations and in general, to perform all the duties usually pertaining to the office.

SECTION 4. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and safely keep all moneys belonging to the Corporation and disburse the same under the direction of the Board of Trustees and to keep accurate records and accounts

of the finances of the Corporation and to perform all the duties usually pertaining to the office.

ARTICLE VII

SECTION 1. Standing committees shall be those created by the Board of Trustees and the members to standing committees shall be appointed by the President.

SECTION 2. The President shall create such special committees as he shall deem necessary and shall appoint the members to such special committees.

ARTICLE VIII

These Regulations may be repealed, amended, or changed by the affirmative vote of a majority of the members present at a meeting held for that purpose.

The undersigned, desiring to form a Corporation, NOT FOR PROFIT, under Section 1702.01 et seq., Revised Code of Ohio, do hereby certify:

- FIRST: The name of the Corporation shall be the MASSILLON TIGER FOOTBALL BOOSTER CLUB, INC.
- SECOND: The place in Ohio where the principal office of the corporation is to be located is 280 Federal Avenue, N.W., Massillon, Ohio 44646, Stark County, Ohio (P.O. Box 19, Massillon, Ohio 44648).
- THIRD: The primary purposes for which said Corporation is formed are:
- A. To promote, encourage and further develop the athletic, educational, and scholarship skills and abilities of high school students at Massillon Washington High School;
 - B. To promote and encourage the high school students to actively participate in the high school football and academic programs and activities related thereto;
 - C. To support, promote and develop the educational, academic and athletic programs for high school students at Massillon Washington High School and promote and encourage better sportsmanship among the students, spectators, participants and the general community;
 - D. To many in Massillon for whom football is important (and that's most in Tigertown), the past is precious.

And for those who seek not just to contemplate, say, the first touchdown ever scored in Tiger Stadium 50 years ago, but would like a gander at the pigskin Tommy James hauled into the end zone that day, there is a place to go and see it — in the future.

There will be a building some day, Junie Studer says.

"We don't yet have an edifice," said Studer, one of the people collecting items for the Tiger Booster Club's Massillon High School Football Museum, "but the day will come, I'm sure, when we will have one."

The ball Tommy James carried in 1939 is one of many items being stored by the Museum Committee at the downtown Massillon First Savings.

Since football interest is at a fever pitch with the Massillon-McKinley game near, many of the items are on display in the First Savings lobby this week.

Memorabilia already in hand includes:

- Game programs from many years.
- Photos of most past Massillon teams.
- The game ball marking the Tigers' most recent "century" milestone, 600 victories.
- Mint-condition binders featuring extensive newspaper pages from past Tiger seasons.
- Old game jerseys and helmets.

The Museum Committee is hoping to round up many more items via tax-deductible donations.

"Even though we don't have a building," said Studer, "we need to collect memorabilia now, or there's no reason to have a museum."

Studer said the committee has been "storing things for years" but hopes to acquire many more items.

Another project of the Museum Committee has restoring old game films and transferring them to videotape.

"Someone brought in school annuals from 1912, 1915 and 1916," Studer said. "They had football sections in them and we were glad to have them. Someone else recently brought in a jersey from the 1930s.

"We're hoping this sort of thing continues, so these items can be returned rather than lost in someone's attic."

Studer said moving memorabilia into a permanent display area "might be 10 years off." He said he favors a site near the new high school, "but that's just an opinion."

He said another possibility would be to locate at the site of the Massillon Museum with the Ohio High School Football Coaches Association Hall of Fame, whose officials have said they would locate here.

"Our endeavor is not a Hall of Fame, however," Studer said. "We don't want to get into 'who's the best right guard ever to play for the Tigers?' This is a museum in which all kinds of memorabilia is welcome."

Your MASSILLON TIGER FOOTBALL MUSEUM At Work

June, 1992

Yes! There is a MUSEUM in Massillon, Ohio, dedicated to the preservation of the past, present, and future endeavors of the Washington High School football teams.

No! There is no permanent edifice where the general public can visit to browse through the collection of articles already obtained by the museum; that is a future dream. It's YOUR Museum because everything in it is due to contributions from people like you: Tiger fans, ex-coaches, ex-players, school administrators, etc. It's AT WORK because the committee members are actively preparing the collection of memorabilia gathered over the last six years for eventual display to the public.

Why has a Museum been started?

Well, one good reason is to ensure that tradition becomes established fact and not just a legend that cannot be verified. Few towns in America have been recognized as much as Massillon has for its success on the high school gridiron, and it is this success that the Museum wants to preserve. The football teams, along with the marching bands, have over the years produced what is affectionately now called "*The High School Football Capital of the World*". One out-of-state newspaper writer put it this way —

The Philadelphia Inquirer — Nov. 10, 1940

“Out of the cradle of professional football, a new gridiron show has been born. Massillon, where world championship professional teams were turned out many times in the first 18 years of the century, is now producing what sports-writers describe as the “Greatest high school show in the country.”

As any Massillon Tiger fan knows, this new gridiron show put on by Washington High School was born with the hiring of a legendary coach in 1932 by the name of Paul Brown. That is sixty years ago. In that span, the Tigers of Massillon have had only one losing season while accumulating a .817 winning percentage! But what a great start to that outstanding winning percentage! After playing a total of 100 games from 1934 to 1943, the Tigers had suffered only three losses and two ties. Seventeen of those victories came against excellent teams from West Virginia, Iowa, Pennsylvania, Massachusetts and Nebraska. Massillon, Ohio was well on its way to being recognized as one of the finest high school football programs in the nation. Throw in Chuck Mathers' 57-3 record from 1948 to 1953 and you have the beginning of what has become a perennial gridiron power that has lasted for six decades. We hope you agree that this is worth saving!

What does the Football Museum do?

It collects, restores, preserves, archives, and catalogs football related memorabilia for future display in a permanent facility. Articles such as clothing, publications, game films, photos, etc., are always a welcome addition to the Museum and are constantly sought after by the committee members.

How does the Football Museum do it?

Space does not permit a detailed account of all the work being performed by the Museum, but here is a brief overview of each task.

Collection — Memorabilia that can be donated or loaned to the Museum should be taken to Gene Boerner at the Massillon Chamber of Commerce (216/833-3146) or to Junie Studer at Studer Signs (216/833-8635).

Restoration — Items presently getting the most attention are team photos and 16mm game films. Restoring the old photos requires the expected work of repairing broken frames and glass, plus cleaning of the photos. Game films get an exceptional amount of attention before they are ever put on the projector for previewing and eventual transfer to video. Every foot of film is checked by hand for breaks, torn sprocket holes, burn spots and poor splices and then repaired. Then, if deemed necessary, they are hand cleaned with a special liquid film cleaner. A normal 400 ft. reel of film in bad condition takes about two hours to repair and clean.

Preservation — Newspapers, game programs, and game films are mainly being worked on in this area. Programs are being photocopied so people can view them while the best originals (if duplicates are available) are sealed in plastic. Individual pages of old newspapers are being encapsulated in neutral pH transparent Mylar polyester film using Double-Coated Film Tape. Game films are being transferred to video using the Super-VHS format which has 400+ lines of horizontal resolution. These copies then become the masters from which standard VHS copies can be made.

Archiving — Presently, the main storage area for memorabilia is the basement rooms of the Massillon Chamber of Commerce. However, some items such as photos, clothing, and souvenirs may be loaned to the Massillon Public Museum when they move into their new building.

Cataloging — The Museum has been divided into seven main categories: Articles, Audio, Video, Film, Publications, Statistics, and Photos. These categories then become the main directories for entering the items of memorabilia into a 2000 Model Amiga computer.

How much memorabilia has the Football Museum collected?

At the moment there is no official report listing each and every item. However, here is a synopsis of what is known:

Game Films — 157,305 feet of 16mm film has been transferred to video. That translates to 494 reels. Varsity games account for 288 reels with the remaining ones being JV games, sophomore games, freshman games, scrimmages, band, etc. Some are still unidentified varsity games.

Newspapers — 75 pages and segments of newspapers dating back to 1905 have been encapsulated. When finished, the count could reach as high as 300.

Photos — No official count of team and individual photographs is available at this time because there are so many. However, preliminary steps have been taken to restore the team photos.

Programs — Plenty of old game programs dating back to 1934 have been donated but no documentation work has been started.

Will the Football Museum sell copies of old game films?

Yes! But this service of the Museum is only in the beginning stages so not all games are available at this time. However, any film transfer or game video that has been archived will be available for purchase, but space does not permit a detailed account of specifics. For further information, please call Bill Oliver at Studer Signs (216/833-8635).

Selling copies of game films should help to pay for material that is constantly needed to accomplish the goal of the Museum. Here is a sample of the prices for some of the more costly items that are needed.

Film Splices — \$30 per box of 400 splices. One film in very bad condition required 97 splices to repair, but the average is about ten splices. This means that about 5000 splices have been used thus far.

Video Tape — \$18.50 per S-VHS 120 min. tape. About ten 400 ft. reels of film fit on one tape. Forty-nine tapes have been filled to date.

Mylar Film — \$58.30 per 40' x 50' roll. This quantity is enough to encapsulate about 22 single newspaper pages so that both sides can be read.

Film Tape — \$6.00 per 65 yard roll. This double-coated transparent sticky tape is used for sealing the mylar film during the encapsulation process.

Wei T'o — \$18.45 per can. This is a nonaqueous deacidification solution for protecting books, documents and works of art on paper against acid-caused embrittlement and yellowing. One can is sufficient for about 10 pages of newspaper.

- Mr. Bill Oliver

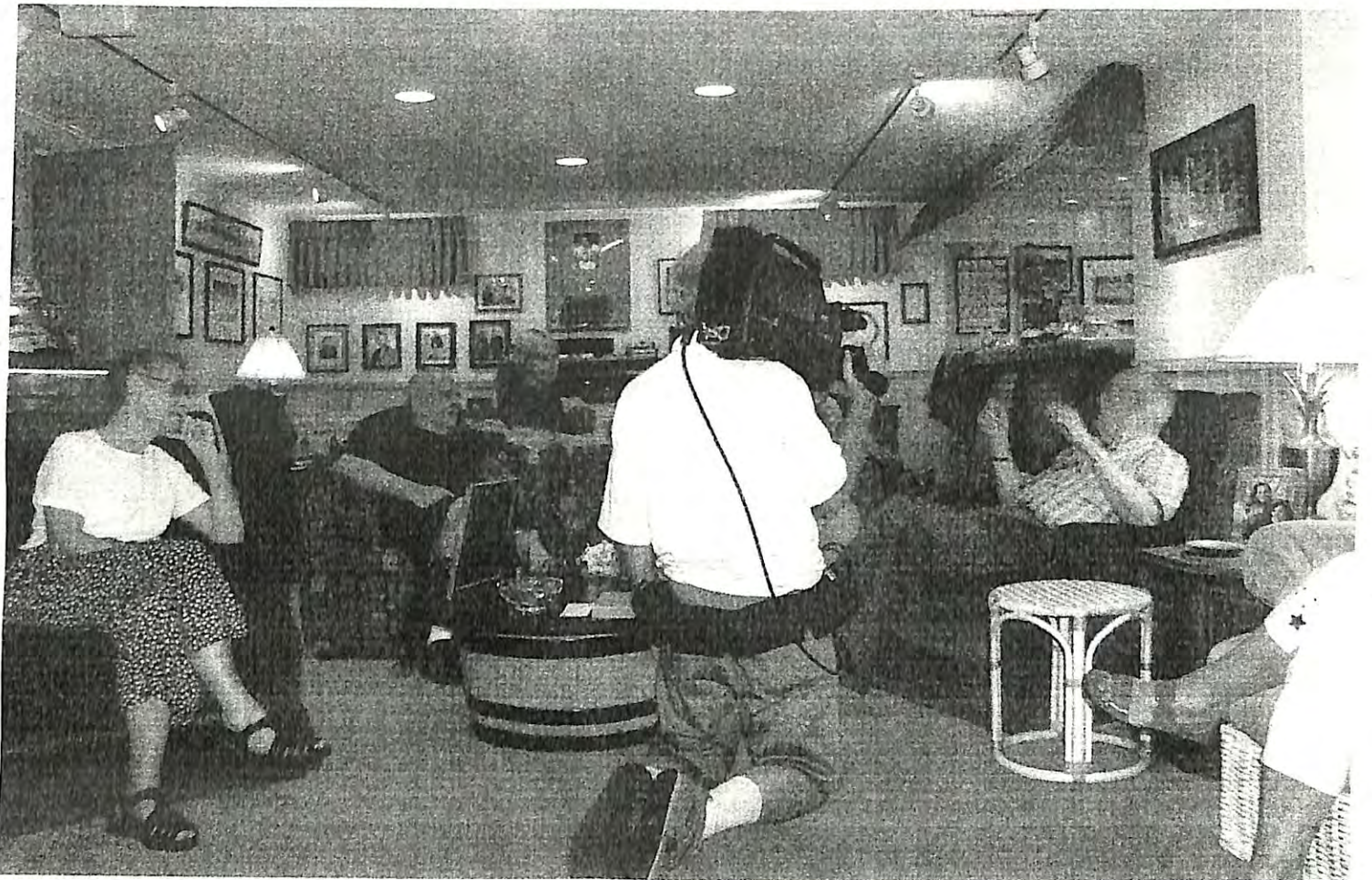

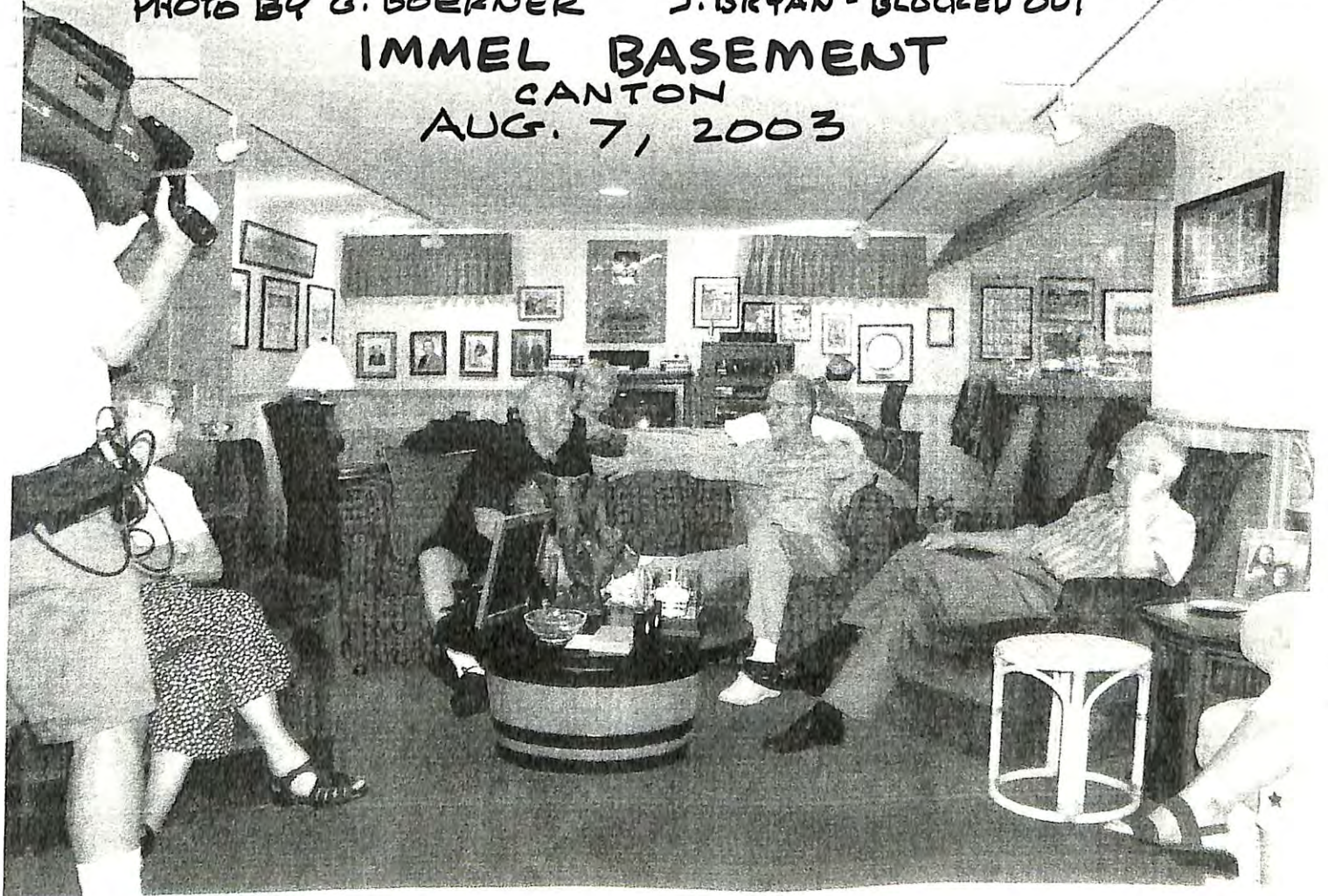

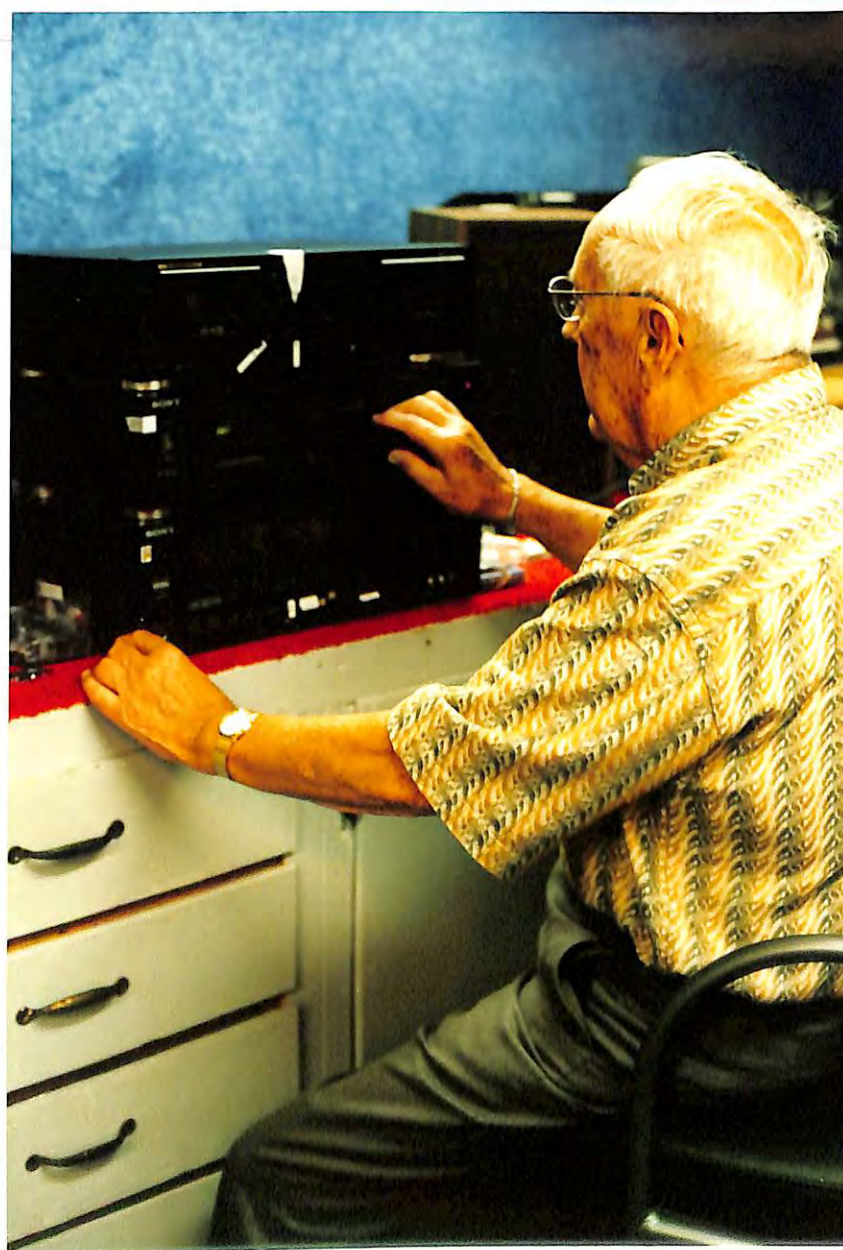

She said the museum's football collection includes hundreds of items, many of them photos and many have never been properly identified.

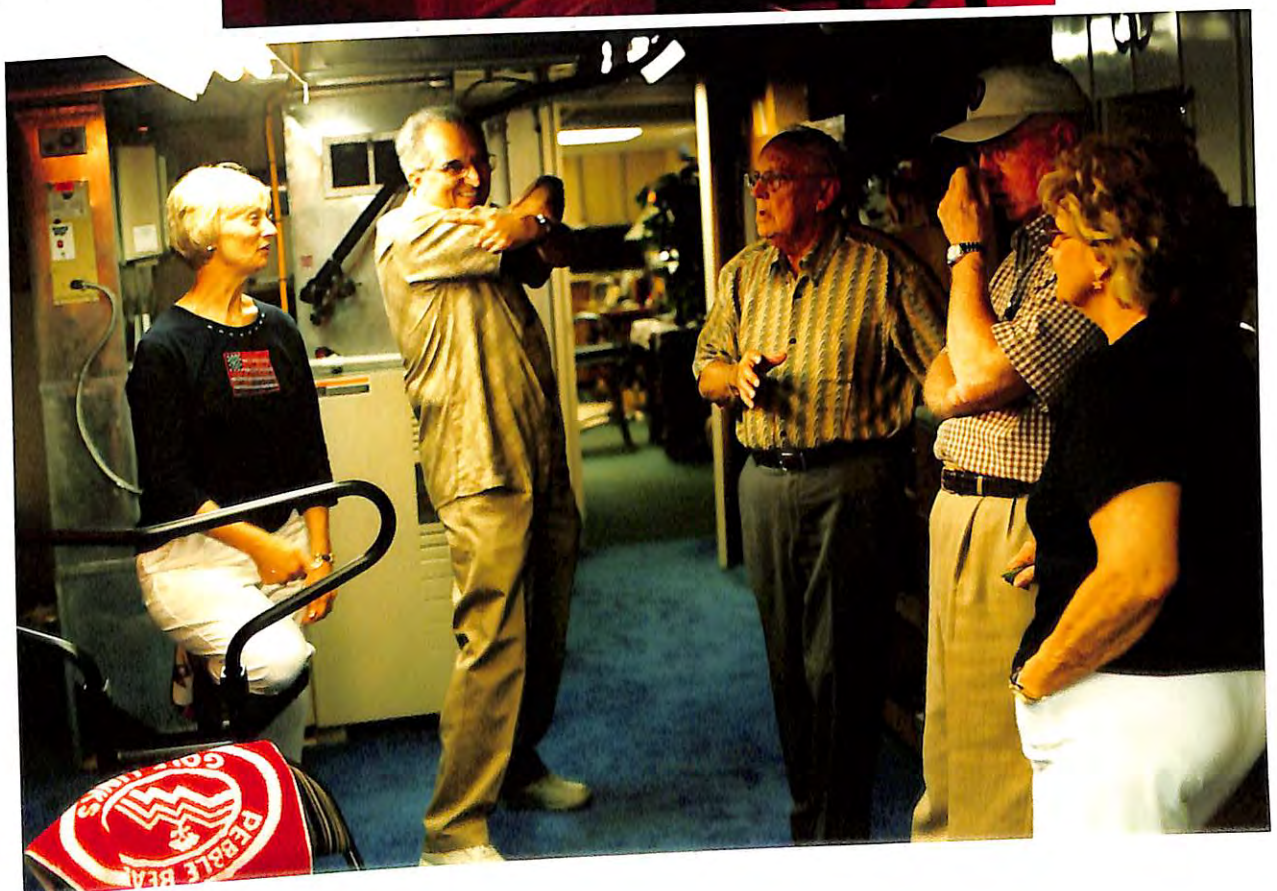
"This is a good opportunity," Paquelet continued, "to remind people when they donate a photo to write the year it was taken and who was in the photo on the back."

AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT made at Massillon, Ohio this ___ day of _____, 1995, between the **MASSILLON MUSEUM**, an Ohio nonprofit Corporation, located at 121 Lincoln Way, East, Massillon, Ohio 44646, (hereinafter referred to as "the Museum") and **THE MASSILLON TIGER FOOTBALL BOOSTER CLUB, INC.**, an Ohio nonprofit Corporation, located at 137 Lincoln Way, East, Massillon, Ohio 44646, (hereinafter referred to as "Booster Club").

PRIMARY PURPOSE

The Museum and Booster Club intend to enter into a custodial arrangement whereby the Booster Club shall deliver to the Museum the Booster Club's collections, memorabilia, films/tapes, artifacts, historical documents, newspapers, football programs, photographs, and uniforms ("Collections"). The Museum intends to care, preserve, store and exhibit the Booster Club's Collections in the Museum's new Sports Gallery and other Museum exhibit space. The Museum and Booster Club intend to preserve the rich tradition of the Booster Club's Collections for historical, educational and general public viewing purposes.

The Parties's mutually agree as follows:

1. **THE MASSILLON MUSEUM:** The Museum is a nonprofit corporation duly organized and existing under Ohio law. The Museum has received a tax-exempt determination letter from the Internal Revenue Service under Section 501(c)(3) of the I.R.C. The Museum operates as a free public Museum in the City of Massillon, Stark County, Ohio. A copy of the Museum's Articles of Incorporation and I.R.S. Tax Determination letter is attached hereto as Exhibit A.

2. **THE MASSILLON TIGER FOOTBALL BOOSTER CLUB, INC.:** The Booster Club is a nonprofit corporation duly organized and existing under Ohio Law. The Booster Club has received a tax-exempt determination letter from the Internal Revenue Service under Section 501(c)(3) of the I.R.C. The Booster is organized as an educational, charitable and community foundation supporting Massillon Washington High School. The

Booster Club possesses a Football Museum containing collections of a historical and educational nature

3. **DELIVERY OF COLLECTIONS:** The Booster Club has legal title to all the Collections covered by this Agreement and more accurately described on the attached "Schedule of Collections" marked Exhibit C; and all future Collections donated to or purchased by the Booster Club. The Booster Club agrees to deliver to the Museum the Collections described on Exhibit C and other Collections from time to time, that the Booster Club receives, in its sole discretion. The Museum agrees to accept delivery of the Collections and any future Collections in a custodial capacity in order to preserve and exhibit the Collections. The Parties agree that the Booster Club shall retain legal title to all the Collections and the Museum shall use its best efforts to inventory, preserve, and exhibit the Collections in the Museum's normal course of business.

4. **INSURANCE AND ACCESS:** The Museum agrees to cover the Collections under its master insurance policy and specifically notify its insurance carrier of the nature and extent of the Collections by delivering to it Exhibit C. The Booster Club and Museum shall mutually agree as to the value to place on the Collectibles. The Parties agree that the Booster Club may designate a volunteer or volunteers to inventory and work on the Collections while the Collections are in possession of The Museum. The Museum and Booster Club shall mutually agree on the designated work area, time and dates, and other restrictions or conditions that may be necessary to allow the Booster Club volunteers to work on the Collections.

5. **NOTICE TO TERMINATE OR REMOVE COLLECTIONS:** Either Party may cancel this Agreement by notifying the other party in writing at least 30 days in advance of its intent to terminate. In the event of this Agreement's termination, the Parties agree to mutually establish a schedule of return of Collections to the Booster Club.

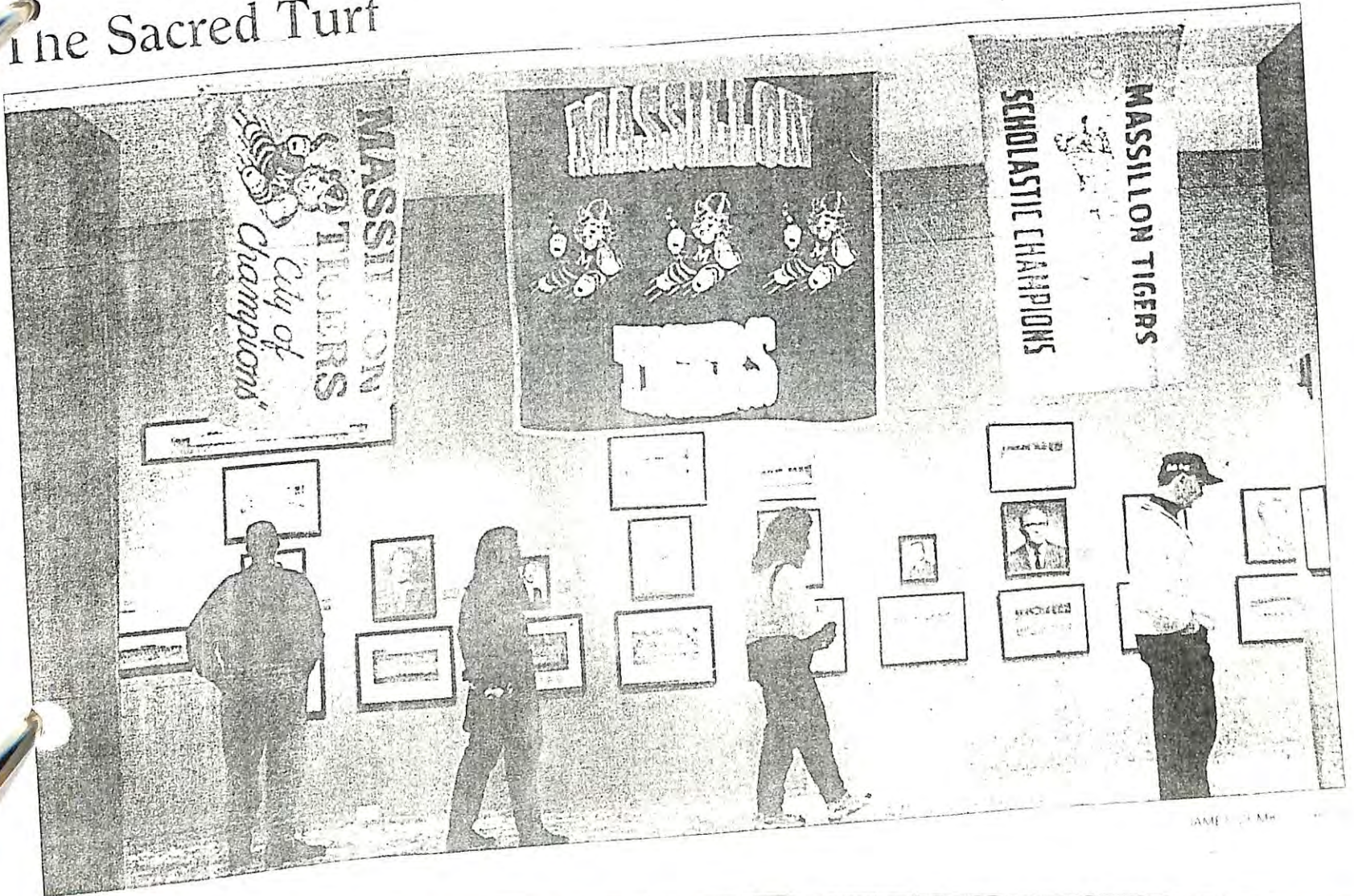


Exhibit to open Sept. 30

Recently my Huron, Ohio, brother-in-law was shown "Go Tiger" by a Huron neighbor and Massillon football player under Lee Tressel. My brother-in-law asked my opinion of the movie. I said I had not seen it but I had heard that some school officials and some former football players were not happy with the portrayal of the Massillon football program. He kept insisting that I see the movie and give him my reaction. I couldn't find it in the Chicago area but my daughter in Tucson obtained a copy for my wife and my son and his family to view this past Christmas.

The football program depicted was completely unlike the one I had the privilege of leading from 1948 to 1954!

I realize that times have changed. A good indicator of the extent of the change was exemplified by the student riots in Columbus after the Ohio State/Michigan game. Our players were to be home by nine o'clock on school nights; they did not possess cars or motor bikes; they did not smoke; a prohibition against drinking alcohol didn't even need to be mentioned. At the conclusion of the season, they either worked or had a conditioning class of basketball, wrestling and/or track under the supervision of Carl Schroeder and Dave Putts. During the summer we provided all players with an eight-hour a day job. We believed working with adults helped them become more mature.

I can't remember much hoopla except for the Canton McKinley game and it was nondestructive. We were dedicated to teaching the proper way of life in addition teaching football. We had a great staff: Paul Schofer, assistant and basketball coach; Carl Schroeder, end and baseball coach; Dave Putts, guard and center; Laurrie Wartianen, tackle; Edward Kammer, backfield. All coaches taught offense and defense. We were given outstanding support from Superintendent L. J. Smith, Principal Irv Snyder, teachers, the school board, and the Boosters Club. What a great group of former players and executives and Boosters were. Luther Emery of the Massillon Independent contributed greatly to our success. I shouldn't forget Bob Hess for movies and Sam Williams for his IBM evaluation of our players and statistics.

The value of our program was indicated by the number of players who went to college and achieved success in their occupations.

"Go Tigers" fell far short of portraying what football meant to us, the players, the parents, the town of Massillon. The vulgar language displayed on the bodies of students

and expressed in the locker room especially since the presence of the camera was known particularly offended members of my family. Players were motivated by derision and verbal abuse. The current program has achieved success on the field but at what cost? Comments from Massillon residents indicate that those who lived in, labored in and loved Massillon were disappointed with the representation.

This movie did not do justice to Massillon football and what it has meant to so many players over these many years.

Just a good manager, not a good 'old' manager

CHICAGO—I read the column by Phil Rogers in last Saturday's Tribune sports section with great interest.

And then I got angry.

Not that I was upset by his stating an opinion that Florida Marlins manager Jack McKeon was making a mistake in deciding to start pitcher Josh Beckett after just three days' rest, in Game 6 of the World Series. Mr. Rogers is entitled to—and he is supposed to—express his views. I admire a journalist who ventures a pre-guess rather than one who always second-guesses.

Mr. Rogers, however, in what I think he perceives as hip humor, has engaged in a nasty bit of Rush Limbaughism when he proposes in such arch-stereotypical terminology that the

driving force responsible for what he contends is Jack McKeon's grievously erroneous decision is Jack's doddering old age.

With references to "Model T's" and "school marms" and by his employment of knee slappers such as "he's so old school that he learned reading, writing, and ciphering," Mr. Rogers proclaims that the grizzled Marlins' skipper is "too old—he's a throwback; not a visionary."

Since when does chronological age, in and of itself, disqualify a person from having a vision or from being able to teach, or to lead? I thought it was ability, preparation, and passion, with some contributions from experience as well, that mattered most. At least that is what NFL coaches Dick Vermeil, at

age 68 the oldest coach in pro football (Kansas City Chiefs, 8-0), and Bill Parcells, age 62 (Dallas Cowboys, 5-2) told me.

Your conclusion, Mr. Rogers, that insidious indications of senility underlie Jack McKeon's inability to think clearly and decisively is not worthy of your pen—(oops, pardon me)—of your word processor. But then again, as I view the photograph that appears alongside your column, I see some traces of gray in your hair. Is it possible that your advancing age makes it more difficult for you to understand that you judge people primarily on the basis of their conduct, their character and their accomplishments?

Now you are probably surmising that this letter is coming

from someone in Jack McKeon's age demographic. If that is what you are thinking, then this time you are correct. But nevertheless, I'll bet you that:

☐ I can still out-run ya.

☐ I can still out-fun ya.

☐ I can still out-fight ya.

☐ And I can even out-write ya!

By the way, just for the record, that old coot Jack McKeon—the one who "thought Josh Beckett was a young 'Iron Man' McGinnity" and would win the World Series for his team ... danged if he wasn't right.

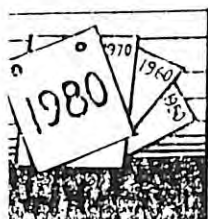

Checking in with
former Bears offensive coordinator
Chuck Mather

Although most football championships won on the gridiron, it could be said the Bears' winning record of 1963 was in great part to a holiday party hosted by Green Bay Packers coach, Vince Lombardi.

Lombardi gave this huge party every year around New Year's Eve," said Chuck Mather, who was the team's offensive coordinator from 1958-1965. "It was quite a party with many media members in attendance including a number of players from New York."

On this particular night Lombardi was in the form," Mather said. "The Packers just completed another good year and as they were telling everybody within earshot they would be a shoo-in for the NFL championship in 1963.

George Halas was sitting nearby as all was going on, and he heard every word.

It made him furious. When he saw the Bears coaches shortly thereafter he said, "We are going to do everything that we can to beat that #1 team!"

Halas immediately turned to his game plan for the coming season and came up with an idea that took his coaches by sur-

prise. "We are going to draw up some plays just for the Packers," Halas said. "We are going to practice them every week but we aren't going to use them against any team."

That just didn't make sense to us at the time," Mather continued. "Most NFL teams didn't have that many plays to choose from."

Why would we go the trouble of drawing up something completely new but only to use it against one team? As you can see, Coach Halas was pretty firm on this. We went along with the plan. It worked, of course it worked. We beat them both times we played them. We were up 1/2 game ahead of the Packers to start the year's championship."

Once the championship had been secured, Mather found a new controversy brewing throughout the team and its play-

er. Although this was before the Super Bowl began winning the NFL championship was a very big achievement, he said. "Players, coaches, and their families were rewarded by team owners. Typically, wives of winning team members received such things as a new car, a fur

coat, or a diamond ring. Coach Halas decided that the perfect gift for the Bears wives would be a gold charm bracelet. Needless to say, many of the spouses felt that they deserved much more."

George Halas had often been described as an owner that was tight with money, but Mather found that he was quite willing to spend if he thought it would bring an advantage to the Bears.

"One good example would be the turf at Wrigley Field," Mather said. "Coach had a theory about that. He decided that the best surface for the Bears would be dirt. To achieve that, he had to have the grass completely covered with tarps every day that the players weren't down there. That was incredibly expensive to do because of the manpower involved."

"Of course that killed all of the grass, but it yielded a nice firm surface. I thought that we had one of the best fields in the NFL. It was great particularly in cold weather. I still feel that it was a significant factor in the final victory over the Giants."

Another costly innovation implemented by George Halas had to do with the use of game film.

"The teams exchanged film then, just as they do today," Mather said. "Coach Halas had copies made of each and every film that came into the Bears office. He kept them for future reference. The cost of building a film library was quite high, but Coach felt that this was money well spent. Turned out that he was right."

George Halas also was one of the first NFL coaches to use computerized ratings on his players.

"I knew a fellow who lived in Canton, Ohio who worked for IBM," Mather said. "He felt that the application for punch cards in football was an important one. I used this system myself while coaching at Massillon High School."

When this was brought to Halas' attention, he was very enthusiastic about the concept," Mather said. "In fact, because I was already familiar with how it worked, Halas thought that I could make a good contribution to the team as the offensive coordinator. That's why I ended up in Chicago. The Bears wanted to grade players using these computerized statistics. That definitely contributed to the success of our 1963 season."

When asked about his favorite player of the 1963 season, Mather paused to think then said one word: "Ditka."

"There aren't really enough good things that I can say about Mike as a player. He was beyond belief even in a squad with standouts such as Bill Wade, Johnny Morris, Mike Pyle, Ed O'Bradovich, and Willie Galimore. Why? Because he just didn't quit."

The single Ditka play that stood out for Mather?

"That's easy to answer," he said. "It was his run against Pittsburgh. That was the weekend after President Kennedy was shot. To say that it was a difficult time to be playing football would have been an understatement. But Coach Halas told us to think of this as a chance to ease people's minds for a while."

"Halas was mad at Bill Wade near the end of the game. It was one of the only times I'd seen him go after Bill. The Bears were behind. Wade had thrown a pass to the end zone but it was dropped by the receiver. Halas was sure it was Wade's fault so he took him out. When it was third and long, Wade was in again."

"We needed at least a tie that day to stay in the championship contest. Things weren't looking good until Bill Wade called a pass to Ditka. Ditka had played most of the game to that point and was exhausted. At any rate, Wade threw the pass; Ditka caught it and ran for the end zone. He must have bounced off of six players on his way there. Nobody could stop him. Finally, he was so exhausted that he pretty much fell down around the 10. We got the field goal and tied the game, thus saving the season."

What differences does Mather see between the players of 1963 and 2003?

"The conditioning, I would say. Remember, in 1963 salaries weren't anywhere near where they are today. Players had to work at other jobs during the off-season. They really didn't begin to work out again until training camp began. Now, players are conditioning themselves year round. It makes a difference in strength."

Mather brought an innovative workout program known as the Halas Mile to the Bears early in his tenure as offensive coordinator.

"I was glad that it was called the Halas Mile and not the Mather Mile because the players hated it," he said. "They had to complete a mile on the run in under seven minutes. Most of these players had never run a mile in their lives. It was pretty funny to watch. Some of the heavier linemen got away with about 1/4 mile or so, as

Mather Bit

Charles (Chuck) V. Mather served as offensive coach for the Bears from 1958-1965. Mather then worked as a college scout for the team from 1965-1975 before leaving football to work in the insurance industry.

Mather first attracted national attention as high school coach in Ohio. During his six-year tenure (1948-54) at Washington High School Mather won consecutive state football titles.

Mather became known in the national coaching community while at Massillon for his innovative use of IBM cards as game films in training players, and for the employment of closed circuit television to give those on the bench a Birdseye view of the action on the field.

In 1954, Mather accepted a coaching position at the University of Kansas where he remained until 1957 when he returned to Ohio to work in the investment business. Eager to return to football, Mather accepted the Bears offer of a coaching position in 1958.

Chuck lives in Chicago's northern suburbs where he is active in business and still keeps up with Bears football.

What does Mather think about the Bears disappointing 2002 season?

"Well, it wasn't as bad as people thought it was. Just as the 2001 season wasn't nearly as good as many felt it had been. Remember many games both years were won or lost in the last few minutes of the games. This is when things can easily go for you, or against you. I feel that the current team is good and will provide a strong basis to build on."

Mather still voices his opinions on the subject to Bears staff members.

"Once a coach, always a coach. I can't Dick Jauron every now and then to tell him what I see and what I'm thinking he could be doing differently. I'll always feel that I am a member of the Bears family. Coaching that team was one of the high lights of my career."



The athletic department of Washington High School used 16mm film to record football games, scrimmages and practices up to the year 1989. In 1990 they officially switched over to S-VHS video.

When the high school moved into its new building near the stadium all existing film at the old school was turned over to the Massillon Tiger Football Museum. That initial collection totaled about 1,000 films and covered approximately 62 years. Since that time the collection has grown to over 1400 films.

For many years each varsity game required 4 reels of film: 2 wide angle and 2 narrow (close up) angle. That would be 40 reels per year and 40 x 62 to get 2480 reels total that could exist. Because of known facts that number can be modified as follows.

1. No wide angle used from 1936 - 1955.

2 reels x 10 games x 19 years = 380 reels

Total = 2480 - 380 = 2100 reels

2. Mansfield game cancelled in 1957 due to flu epidemic.

Total = 2100 - 4 = 2096 reels

3. Eleven games were played in 1960/61/62.

4 reels x 3 extra games = 12 reels

Total = 2096 + 12 = 2108 reels

4. Eleven playoff games from 1972 to 1989.

4 reels x 11 games = 44 reels

Total = 2108 + 44 = 2152 reels

5. Reliable sources state that many early films were thrown away so that the metal reels could be turned in for the War effort. Therefore, 57 missing films between 1936 and 1945 may never be found.

2 reels x 57 games = 114 reels

Total = 2152 - 114 = 2038 reels

The present collection of varsity game films on video totals 901 which means only 44% of the possible existing films have been collected and/or located. Therefore, one of the many goals of the Football Museum is to locate, collect, repair and preserve the remaining 16mm film that may still exist but now reside in the attics and basements of homes throughout the country.

Locating and collecting past game film has been a difficult task with limited funds and man power. Nevertheless, film has sporadically been finding its way back to the museum through word of mouth and recently via the special advertisement on the once a month Booster Club page in the Massillon "Independent" newspaper. An example of a chance finding is when Alex Wood was invited to be the main speaker at the Ohio High School All-Star banquet in July of 1998. He played for the Tigers back in 1972 and is now the Head Coach at James Madison University in Harrisonburg, Virginia. He was asked about game films and responded that he had several from his playing days which he promptly returned to us when he got back to Virginia. He had no idea the museum was searching for film.

Repair and preservation of past game film is essential if ex-players, coaches and fans want to enjoy the past accomplishments of the Massillon Tiger football teams for many years to come. No one knows how long film will last and it's too costly to duplicate so it is fortunate that another medium (video) can be used for preservation and duplication. It sounds simple when you hear that to transfer film to video only requires pointing a video camcorder at the screen of a film being projected. But long before that happens each film gets an exceptional amount of attention before ever being put on a projector for previewing and eventual transfer to video. All film has been found to have some amount of physical damage. Therefore a hand winder is used to inspect every inch of film for breaks, torn sprockets, burn spots and poor original splicing. Also, some film needs to have missing leader put on the front and back ends or original defective leader replaced. A normal 400-ft reel of film in bad condition takes two to three hours to check and repair. One film in very bad condition required 194 splices and approximately 8 hours to repair.

To help preserve each film after repair it is given a bath using Edwal Anti-Stat Film Cleaner which safely cleans and lubricates color and B/W film that has acetate and polyester bases. It also makes them static-free and "dust resistant." This process is again done by hand using the hand winder and takes approximately 20 minutes.

When a film can move through a projector without jumping sprockets or breaking it is ready to be transferred to video: a media that is only 20 years old at the consumer cassette level but has been around for about 44 years at the professional level. To get a good transfer requires a projector with a frame rate control and a video camera with an excellent zoom lens and aperture adjustment. The frame control is used to overcome flicker that is seen when no adjustments are made. This is because film is recorded at 24 frames-per-second while video is recorded at 30 frames-per-second. A good aperture adjustment is needed to overcome the variations in film contrast due to photographic errors made by the cameramen. A good zoom lens makes it easier to adjust the aspect ratio during transfers.

Film-to-video transfers of game films were first started in 1979 using the only economically feasible equipment: Consumer quality VHS (Video Home System). Eight years later (1988) the much improved version of VHS known as

Super VHS (S-VHS) came out which was much closer to professional equipment in image resolution. (400 lines of horizontal resolution verses 280 for VHS) This means the image has almost twice as much detail and can be edited and copied with little loss in that extra picture detail.

In 1998 we are seeing the beginning of another revolution in video equipment that could affect the storage of past game films. All video equipment - consumer and professional - which had been recording the image signals on tape using the analog method is changing to digital recording. This is another big step forward in the video industry in its attempt to give people the best picture quality possible at the consumer and professional levels. The equipment is expensive now but as soon as the Football Museum can afford to purchase digital video, all game films will be retransferred to this new format in its attempt to preserve the 62 years of game films. And look out because here comes Digital Versatile Disc. That is what I would love to see all of our football films end up on some day. It could be the ultimate storage media for now.

Once a film has been transferred to the so called S-VHS master copy it is easy to think that the film has lost its usefulness and not to worry about what happens to it. Not so and here is a few reasons why.

- a) Actual film present on a standard 400 foot reel varies from 150 to 400 feet. There are now 1600 reels of film on 155 master video tapes which means each tape can accommodate about 10 reels. (10.45 to be exact) Most of the films are not in sequence so that when it is time to create a for-sale master copy of a particular year many different master tapes have to be used over and over again to obtain a finished product. This produces a lot of wear on these tapes and the eventual need to produce a new master by doing another film transfer.
- b) Video tape is much more vulnerable to damage than film even though it's inside a hard plastic cassette shell. Here is a few examples:
 1. Magnetic fields - Quickly erases tape but no harm to film.
 2. Water - No way to safely clean tape but film can be wiped dry and cleaned.
 3. Breakage - If a VCR breaks a tape it can but should never be spliced back together to prevent damage to the read/write heads in the VCR. Film breakage can and is often spliced.
 4. Wrinkling - A malfunctioning VCR can easily do this while loading, unloading or playing a tape. This puts permanent moving streaks on that part of the video image. Little or no visual effects are seen on film.
 5. Longevity - Our oldest films have survived 63 years in relatively good shape. S-VHS video tapes have been around for only 11 years.

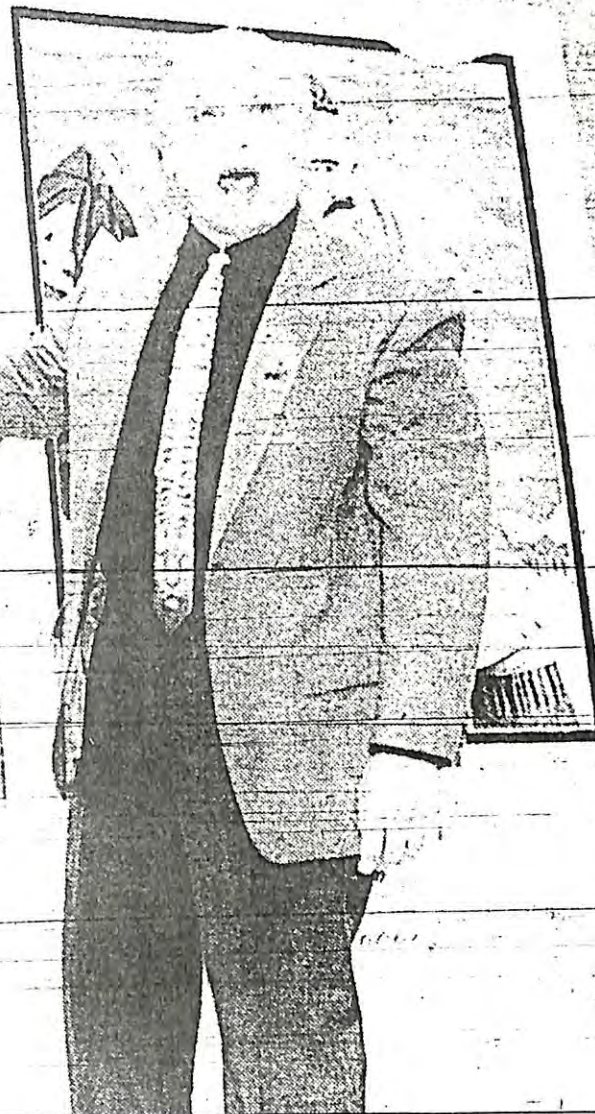
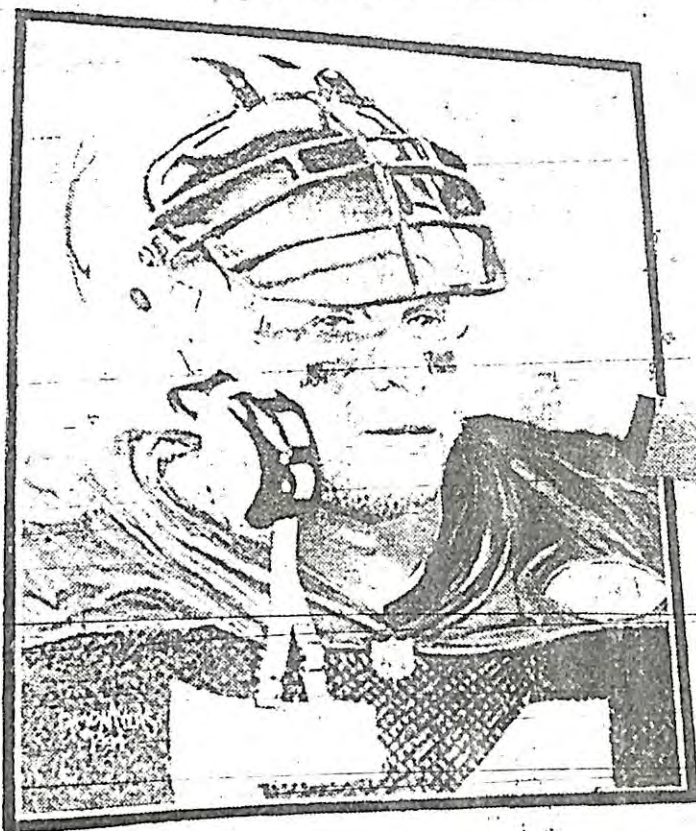

- c) A transfer trick can be done to make a wide angle film look like a narrow angle (close-up) film. This is done by using the zoom lens to focus in closer and pan the camera to follow the action. This has been done on several occasions so far and will be done again when necessary if no narrow angle film of a particular game can be found.

With the fast pace changes in storage methods of motion pictures it is necessary to have game films close at hand so that retransfers can be done as quickly as possible. That is why our wish is for all persons in possession of 16mm game films to donate their films to the Football Museum. We respect any request for return of film from us after it is repaired and transferred and will do so along with the complimentary video copy of the transfer. However, please consider our desire to keep Massillon Tiger film in one storage area were it can be cared for properly so that all future tiger fans will be able to see their past football history in the video format of their generation.



Take care with your CDs, DVDs

Q. What's the best way to handle and store CDs and DVDs?

A. The answer depends on whether your disc is meant for everyday or archival use. If you're expecting your data to survive five or 10 years, or even longer, you'll have to take special care.

The National Institute of Standards and Technology, or NIST, recently subjected CDs and DVDs to a series of stresses. Researchers built chambers increasing heat, humidity and light to mimic aging and found the recordable DVD it tested should last 30 years if stored at 77 degrees and at 50 percent relative humidity. Tests on other types of discs are ongoing.

But conditions often are less than ideal, so count on migrating your data to a new disc long before the 30 years are up.

And more likely, if you wait that long, you won't have the equipment capable of reading today's file formats.

Your word processor is likely to go through a dozen or more generations by then and would be incapable of reading documents stored today. So you may have to convert your music, pho-

tos, documents and other files to newer formats several times along the way.

The type of blank CD or DVD you buy for burning can matter, although there's no easy way to tell which is best, said Fred Byers, an information technology specialist at the NIST.

Generally brand names are better, and ones made with gold are the best, although they're more expensive and harder to find, Byers said. If you're just burning a CD to play music in your car stereo, however, a cheap, generic disc may do just fine – you can always burn another one.

Be careful about stick-on labels. They're not recommended if you want your disc to last more than a few years, Byers said.

You can write on the top side using CD-safe markers – generally labeled nontoxic. Avoid hard tips; felt tips are fine, unless you press down hard. And CDs are more vulnerable than DVDs to harm from writing because the layer that stores the data is closer to the top.

Handle discs using the edges or the center hole. Fingerprints will cause more trouble than scratches, although prints can be wiped off with a cotton cloth dipped in water, rubbing alcohol or special cleaning solutions sold in stores.

When storing CDs and DVDs, jewel cases are the best. If you can, keep them vertical, like books on a shelf, rather than flat, as the disc may eventually bend if your shelf does.

Paper envelopes, plastic sleeves or the spindles you buy blank discs in are theoretically OK, but they increase the risk of scratching and smudging in handling, Byers said.

Again, don't worry about it as much if you're just burning music for a car stereo.

CDs and DVDs also are vulnerable to light, heat and humidity – and a combination will damage a disc much more quickly than any single element, Byers said. A surefire way to lose data is to keep the disc on the dashboard of your car, parked on a treeless street on a hot, humid summer day.

Prerecorded DVDs, including movies you buy, are especially sensitive because they use aluminum, which reacts with oxygen, Byers said. Keep them in the original cases, away from the sun.

If you do have trouble reading a disc, don't toss it right away.

It may still work on other drives, particular ones that burn discs. Perhaps you can use that machine to copy data to a new disc to play on read-only machines.

(Though for movie DVDs that are copy-protected, the head of the Motion Picture Association of America recommends you simply buy a new DVD.)

THE MASSILLON TIGER FOOTBALL

MUSEUM is the fulfillment of an idea conceived by the football booster club in 1979. In that year plans were made, a committee formed and seed money raised to start a booster club sponsored museum that would dedicate its activities to preserving the history of the tiger football program and its many gridiron accomplishments. That initial endeavor has culminated in a very gratifying collection of memorabilia for future generations of football fans to review and enjoy. The collection process has been ongoing for over twenty five years and donations of Massillon football related items are always welcome. Documentation, repair, preservation and storage of valued items is also an ongoing process and is done by the committee members on a voluntary basis. A detailed account of all items collected is still not available but the following information about specific categories of memorabilia will explain what is being done.

Film---Approximately 1600 reels of silent 16mm films have been found and archived. After repair and cleaning they are transferred to video. Film content includes football, band and basketball. To date 480,000 feet of film has filled up 170 video tapes. The oldest film is 1934. Many of the films have been used to make special production videos and are available for purchase. (see the separate catalogue for the listing of these special productions)

Video---Taping of Tiger home & away football games plus football related events began in 1979. The sound track on most of the game tapes is play-by-play radio broadcast audio provided by station WTIG. All of these tapes are available for purchase. (a listing of these game video tapes can be found on the booster club web site---Massillontigers.com)

Audio---Reel-to-reel tapes with radio broadcast recordings of Tiger games were donated to the museum and are being used to produce special production videos by synchronizing the audio to the game film when possible. The recordings are mainly Massillon - McKinley games with the earliest one being 1953. The oldest game audio is 1944 via two 16 inch diameter 78RPM transcription discs of the Massillon - McKinley game and Tiger Swing Band halftime show. Film of the 1944 game and band for this audio is in the museum archives and will be synchronized in the future. Also, many reel-to-reel tapes of Massillon high school concert band performances are in the museum archives.

Photographs--- Several hundred original and copies are being repaired (if needed) and catalogued. The collection includes photos of the teams, coaching staffs, game action, players and Tiger Swing band. One of the oldest found is a 1925 group shot of Paul Brown, Elwood Kammer, Arden McConnell, Whitey Laughlin in uniform that was enlarged and hung in the top floor of the East side stadium press box.

Printed Media---This category includes books, magazines, newspapers, game programs, media guides and school yearbooks. These publications abound with stories and information of the history of the Massillon high school Tigers. An abridged listing of these items is as follows:

Books: The Paul Brown Story by Jack Clary; The Massillon Tigers Story by John (Jack) White Jr.; The Town Tiger by Wibur Arnold Jr.; Massillon Memories by Scott Shook; Ohio High School Football by Carl Benhase; James by Coach Don James as told to Virgil Parker; EARLE A Coach's Life by Earle Bruce with George & Darcy Lehner.

Magazines: LIFE (1939); Pathfinder (1947); HOLIDAY (1949); SPORT (1951); Ohio's FIRST and TEN (1953); People (1953); LOOK (1955); LIFE (1955); Sports Illustrated (1961); HIGH SCHOOL FOOTBALL (1963); ESQUIRE (1965); Boys' Life (1966); CLEVELAND (1977); OHIO (1983); Sports Illustrated (1994).

Newspapers: Over 5,000 original pages have been found and preserved from 13 Ohio cities and cities from 9 other states plus national editions such as The National Observer (1963); USA Today (1985,1993,2001); The Wall Street Journal (1984). The oldest publication archived is a 1903 Massillon Independent. The most unique find was the entire year's edition of the 1932 Massillon Independent: the year Paul Brown became head coach.

Printed Media---(cont.....)

Game Programs: Approximately 3,500 have been collected dating back to Massillon's first issue in 1934. The oldest official program found is for the 1933 Massillon – McKinley game. Before programs the fans were given cards with team schedules, or rosters or starting line-ups. The oldest such card is 1923.

Media Guides: Original copies of these yearly information publications reside in the museum.

School Yearbooks: The following 17 Massillon Washington High School yearbooks reside in the museum. 1912, 15, 16, 25, 26, 46, 52, 54, 55, 56, 57, 58, 61, 64, 66, 70, 2002. There is also one 1929 Canton McKinley yearbook.

Collectables—This group of memorabilia includes team banquet glasses, clothing, pennants, scrapbooks, flags, footballs and etc.... They are too numerous to mention and still being catalogued.

The roots of the game of football are anchored deep in North East Ohio and especially Stark County where the first Massillon Washington High School team was organized in 1894. The sport quickly became a favorite pastime as attendance grew yearly with a record setting 20,000 plus fans jamming the stadium in 1936 to watch the 9 and 0 Tigers of Massillon take on the 9 and 0 Bulldogs of Canton. The head coach of the Tigers that year was Paul Brown who established a successful football program and winning tradition during his nine years at Massillon. The winning tradition continued with other head coaches and it is this continued history of gridiron success that the Football Museum is trying to preserve. Few towns in America have been recognized as much as Massillon has for its success on the high school gridiron and the museum wants to ensure that this tradition becomes established fact and not a legend that cannot be verified.

The football teams, along with the marching bands, have over many years produced what is affectionately now called "The High School Football Capital of the World." One out-of-state newspaper writer put it this way ---

The Philadelphia Inquirer – Nov, 10, 1940

"Out of the cradle of professional football, a new gridiron show has been born, where world championship professional teams were turned out many times in the first 18 years of the century, is now producing what sportswriters describe as the
"Greatest high school show in the country."

A look into the history of Booster Clubs and their roots in Massillon, Ohio

Two years after Paul Brown earned the head coaching job for the Massillon Tigers, he acted on a suggestion from a board of education member, Karl "Kit" Young, to form a booster club. On September 12, 1934, fewer than 100 men assembled in the Washington High School Gymnasium and hence the first football booster club was formed in the United States.

Brown is considered the greatest innovator in National Football League history. He has been credited with many firsts, most of which were born during his time as coach for the Massillon Tigers.

One such innovation is the formation of a booster club that lives strong today in Massillon, Ohio and has been adapted by athletic departments across the world at all levels of competition.

For years, Massillon has been looked upon as a founding force in high school football. Its time to tell the story behind the program.

Though the exact impetus for the birth of the Boosters is not important, it is important to document the beginning and evolution of the booster club, credit it to the man, town and townspeople who created yet another innovation to America's most celebrated sport.

The story will be told by members of Brown's family, Massillon booster historians, professional football players, coaches and front office personnel.

Paul Brown Museum to preserve coach's memory

The athletic life of Paul Brown will be on display in a museum beside Washington High School in a little less than two years, if recent fund-raising efforts are successful.

It is the way the legendary athletic figure wanted to be remembered, say members of the Massillon Tigers Football Booster Club, which is proposing the Paul E. Brown Museum be constructed between the high school and the new indoor athletic practice facility.

"He always said, 'My Massillon things go back to Massillon.' He told me that," said Gene Boerner, booster club member and committee media liaison. Boerner knew Brown from his affiliation with Massillon's booster club and knows his widow, Mary Brown, who donated many of the more than 300 Brown artifacts the museum has on hand.

"She's fulfilling his wish," Boerner said. "We have all his Massillon stuff and many of his other things. We have things from when he was nine months old to right before he died (in 1991)."

MUSEUM MISSION

Boerner said the mission of the \$700,000, 3,000-square-foot museum will be one of education - teaching Massillon athletes and other students the history of Massillon football, the value of tradition, and the rewards of discipline. The museum will be located at One Paul E. Brown Drive SE, on the high school campus, adjacent to the football stadium that bears the coach's name.

Bill Dorman, spokesman for the booster club's museum committee, said the placement will allow Massillon athletes passing in nearby corridors to view the interior of the museum through large glass panes.

"It's important that we keep the Paul Brown and Massillon Tiger tradition in front of student athletes on a daily basis," said Massillon football coach Tom Stacy.

Design of the museum is being completed by Harris Day Architects. Interactive displays will allow visitors access to information about Brown, who coached the Massillon Tigers to an 80-8-2 record with six state and four national championships. Brown led Ohio State to its first national championship, was the first coach of the Cleveland Browns, and founded the Cincinnati Bengals.

A large video display with stadium seating will allow visitors to the museum to watch Brown's "Science of Football" and other entertaining and educational videos.

Memorabilia will include artifacts illustrating Brown's life beyond the borders of Massillon. On display will be a suitcase Brown took to away games - a carrying case that contains such personal items as glasses, a Bible, and clothing. Also to be exhibited is Brown's HOF jacket enshrinee's jacket.

HIS BIBLE

Dorman said that one of the most unique artifacts to be on display is a book written and autographed by Knute Rockne, coach of the University of Notre Dame during one of its golden eras. Brown made margin notes in the book, and diagrammed plays in it as he was reading.

"It was his bible when he first started coaching," Dorman explained.

Dorman said that artifacts will be secured under glass, so the museum can be open unattended. Admission will be free, although donations will be accepted.

"This is an excellent time to initiate this project," said Dorman. "It's the diamond anniversary of Paul Brown's coming to Massillon and the 65th

anniversary of Ohio State's first national title under his leadership. In 2009, we'll mark the 100th anniversary of the birth of this great man."

The building is to be open by September 2009, construction will have to begin by late 2008 or early 2009, said Dorman, "depending on the success of fundraising.

The booster club and the Paul and Carol David Foundation will provide seed money. The campaign will solicit "significant financial support," but also will welcome individual contributions. Major contributors will be recognized with "autographs" on a football-shaped plaque in the museum, he said.

A fund for the construction of the museum has been set up at First Merit Bank, said Dorman, who played tackle on the 1969 Massillon Tigers football team. Dorman can be reached at (330) 495-2147 or at teammates@PaulEBrownMuseum.com

Dorman said he believes the museum will draw visitors from far beyond Stark County.

"Not a whole lot of museum are dedicated to single sports figures. Of course, there are not a whole lot of sports figures like Paul Brown," he said, listing Brown's major coaching stops - Massillon, Columbus, Cleveland and Cincinnati. "He had such an impact throughout Ohio. He hardly left the borders. He's really important to the state as a whole."

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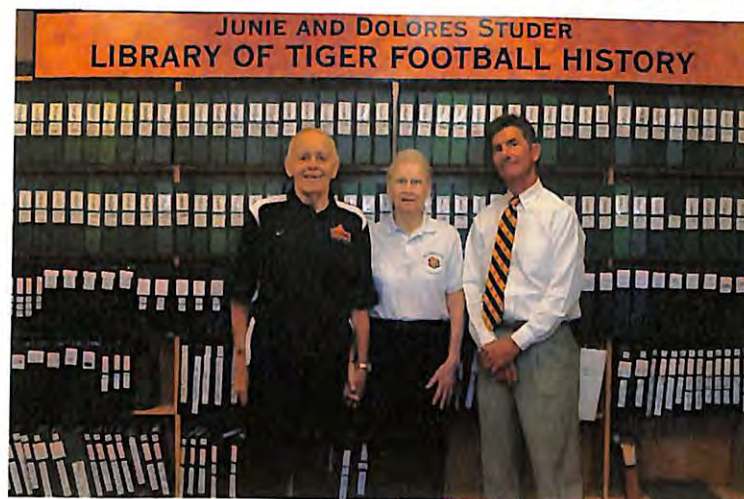

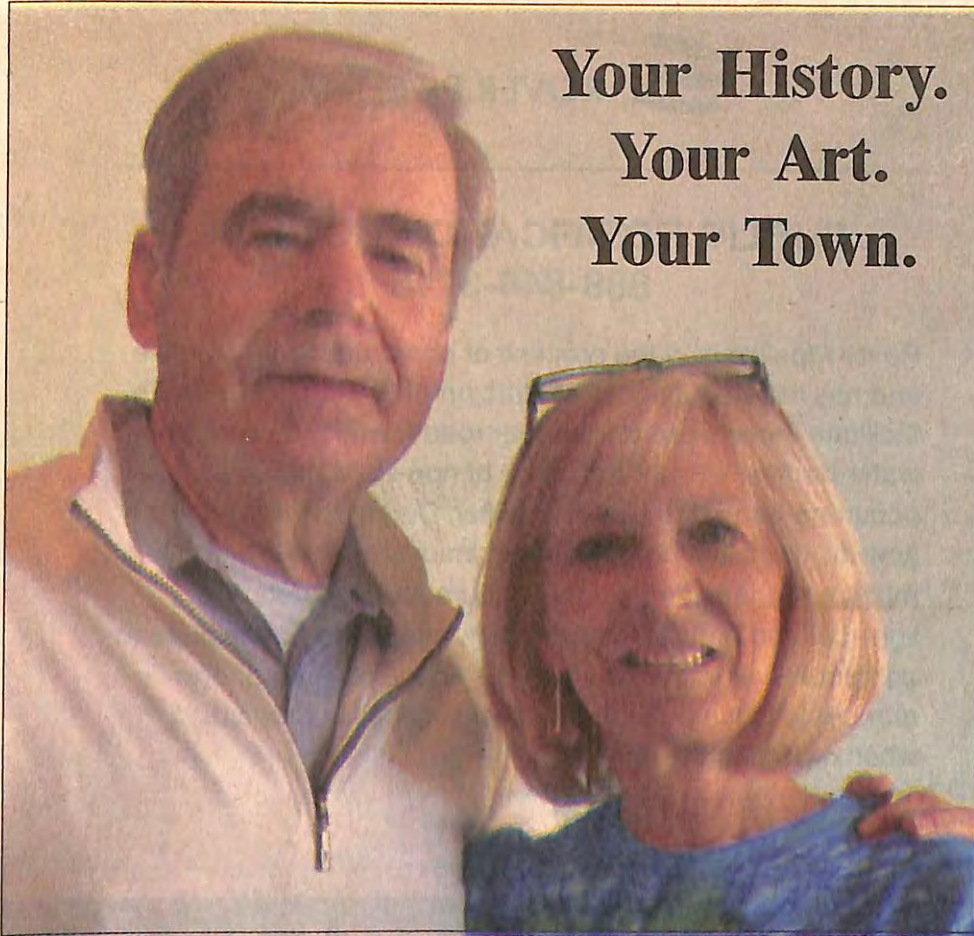

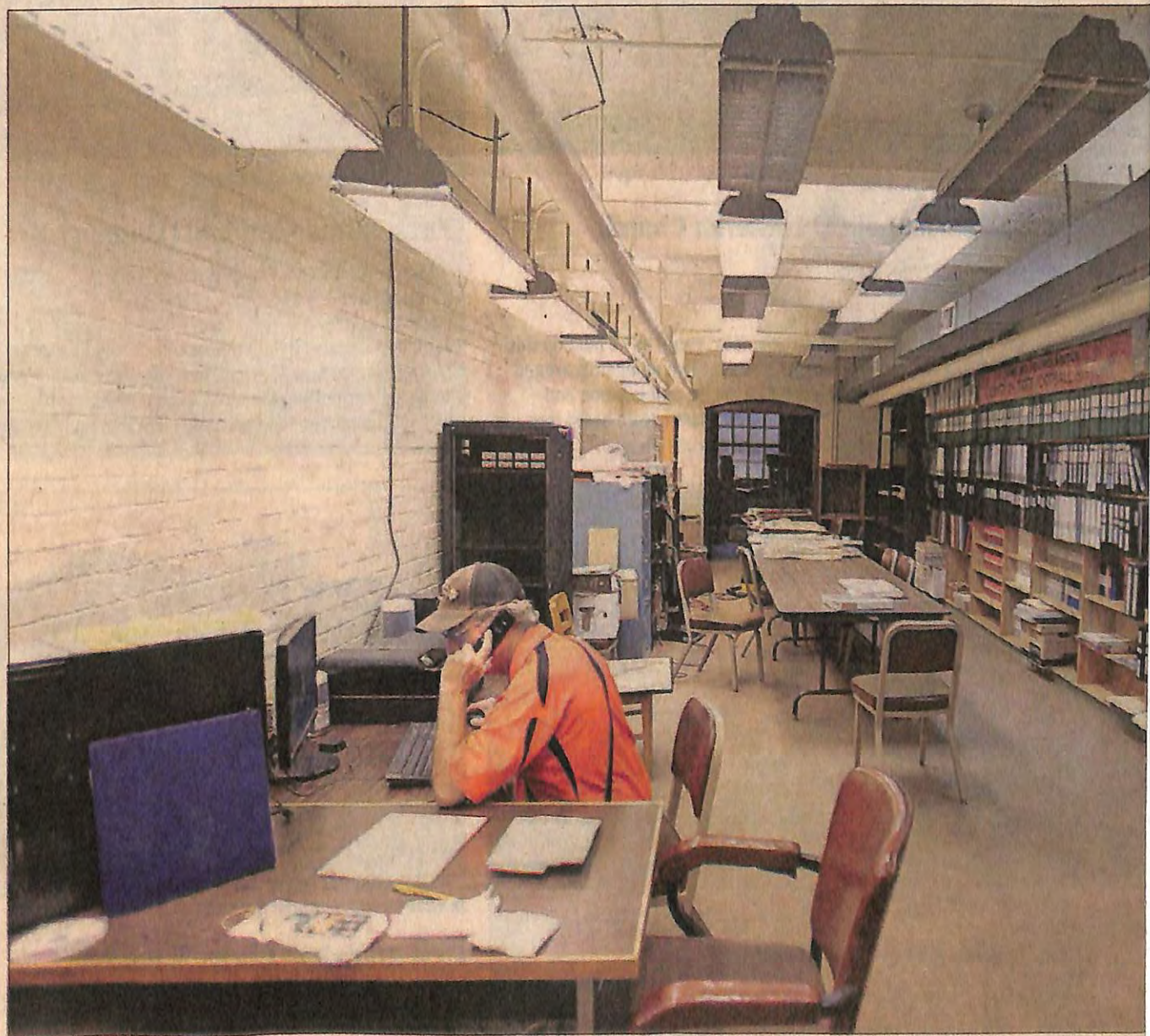

Old post office housing Tigers memorabilia MassMU's Paul Brown Museum fits

The building once processed the mail. Now, for the time being, it's protecting much of the proud history of one of the nation's most storied high school football programs.

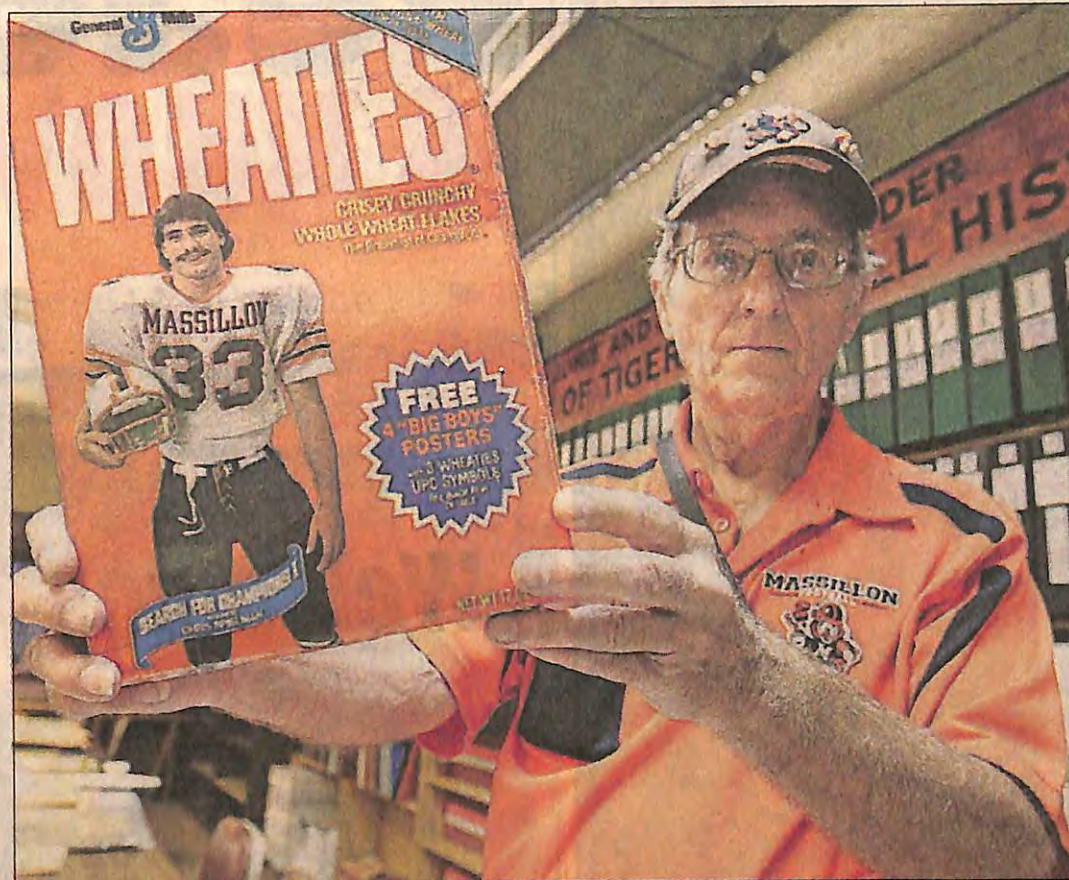
The basement of the former post office at 22 Federal Ave. NE, accessible by a set of steps in the rear of the building, is the home of massive amounts of Tiger football history. This has been the repository for stacks of newspapers, game film and so many other pieces of Massillon memorabilia since the spring of 2013.

However, the stay is temporary. It will move again to what is expected to be its final location as part of the Massillon Museum's \$3.5 million expansion, which is expected to be completed by Aug. 1, 2018. It will be called the Paul Brown Museum at the Massillon Museum.

Some of the items which still were in storage at the old post office building — roughly 25 percent — have been moved into the Massillon Museum's archives. The state had provided \$75,000 to the museum for the creation of the Paul Brown Museum.

The final move will give even more prominence to the collection, which has been in a constant state of movement until 2013.

That's when a committee of five — Ron Prunty, Ron Styer, Gary Vogt, Jim Barkan and Larry Fuller — took it upon themselves to organize the large quantity of Tiger memorabilia which existed both in their personal collections as well as the collections of other community members in the

basement of the old post office.

"If we didn't have it all in one place, it would be scattered all over the place," Prunty said when the museum first debuted. "Who knows where it would end up? ... So, it's found a home."

Maybe the crown jewel of the museum is the Junie and Delores Studer Library. It covers one full wall in the central room of the museum, and within its binders is the story of the Massillon football program, as told in many newspaper and magazine articles.

There are binders dedicated to each Tiger season, dating back to the inaugural campaign in 1894. Every player, coach or individual connected to the program is documented within those binders, a lasting legacy for anyone who played a part in the tradition that is Massillon football.

It was a library which the Studers started at the time of his retirement in 2001. Vogt, the Massillon Tiger Football Booster Club historian, has maintained it since 2010.

"The thing they call the Studer Library is an amazing work," past Booster Club president Jim Bryan said at the time of Junie Studer's passing in 2015. "I'm going to call it a work, because it isn't a feat. When I was a kid they had this thing called the

'Dazzling' new post office in 1913

MASSILLON Upon its 1913 dedication, the new post office constructed of white limestone at the northeast corner of Erie Street N and Plum Street, now Federal Avenue NE, was described as "dazzling" under the sun's rays.

Situated on lot 24, sold in the 1830s in two separate parts by Massillon founder James Duncan, one part eventually was acquired by the sons of Mayhew Folger, Robert and William. Mayhew,

appointed in January 1828 as the first postmaster in Massillon, was succeeded after his death later that year by William, who for just over three and a half years owned part of the future post office property

before selling to John E McLain in 1839.

McLain eventually acquired the entirety of lot 24, where he built a one-and-a-half story home facing Erie Street that was later the residence of Charles M. Russell, a

founder and first director of C. M. Russell & Co., at the time of his death in 1860. Decades after its most famous resident had departed, the house was demolished to make way for the post office, which, in need of greater space, would itself be replaced in 1970 by a modern structure constructed further south on Erie Street.
